## Feminist writer to visit

Judith Johnson Sherwin, feminist author who won the Playboy Fiction Prize in 1977, will make public appearances at the University Tuesday and Wednesday.

She will give an informal talk on contemporary writing in poetry, drama and fiction and will answer questions afterward. The talk will be in Room 154 Straub Hall at 4 p.m. Tuesday.

Wednesday she will give a poetry reading at 8 p.m. in Room 123 Science. The session, called "Poetry and Rock 'n Roll," will include audience participation.

Sherwin will autograph books from 4 to 5 p.m. Wednesday at the Book and Tea Shop, 1646 E. 19th Ave.

All events are open to the public at no charge. Sherwin's short fiction has been published in Ms. Magazine as well as in Playboy, literary magazines, and in her own collection, "The Life of Riot." She began to publish poetry at the age of 18 as an Atlantic Monthly Poet. Her poetry has appeared since then in numerous magazines and anthologies and in three of her own books. Her credits also include four plays.

Sherwin's appearances at the University are sponsored by the English and Speech Department, the University Assembly and Lectures Committee and the University Women's Studies Program.

## Series sets religion panel

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## Events for Palestine slated

The Committee for Justice in Palestine will present three days of exhibits, films and discussion on the Palestinians as it will try to answer "Who are they, what do they do, where are they and what do they want," all in the EMU, rooms to be posted.

Today at 2:15, a film entitled "The Key to Palestine" will be shown and later repeated at 7:30 p.m.

A slide show on "Palestine is the Issue" will run all day Monday. Tuesday's films are "Tomorrow Begins Today" at 12:15 p.m., a reflection of life in a refugee camp and "Your Friend Omar," produced by the United Nations, at 7:30 p.m. The all-day slideshow is called "Palestine Holding On."

"Adjust Peace in the Middle East" will be shown from 7 to 9 p.m. Wednesday. It is a filmed debate between four Jewish scholars.

## Prof. to give piano recital

William Woods, University music school professor, will give a piano recital Tuesday at 12:30 p.m. in Beall Concert Hall.

The program for the recital is Sonata in E-flat (Hob. no. 49) by Haydn; Three Preludes, "Sails," "What the Westwind Saw" and "Ondine" by Debussy; "Moments Musiceaux" in A-flat (Op. 94 no. 6) and in F-minor (Op 94 no. 3) and "Impromptu" (Op. 90 no. 4) by Schubert.

Woods will also perform two compositions by Bartok, "Divided Arpeggios," "Minor Seconds, Major Sevenths" and "Three Dances in Bulgarian Rhythms," also by Bartok.
