Simic to fill new top level U position

University Pres. William Boyd announced Friday the appointment of Curtis Simic as the first vice-president for public service for the University.

Simic, 36, is currently an assistant vice-president for resource development at the University of Alabama.

Boyd says Simic's position is one of "extreme importance for the future of the University."

The position was created last fall to coordinate the University's fundraising, media, community services, governmental and alumni relations.

"He has an outstanding record in the field of external relations, and I'm confident he will provide the leadership needed to make the University more effective in serving Oregon and in gaining support needed to keep the University at a high level of quality," Boyd says.

Simic will fill the position in July.

Simic has held similar positions at Yale University of Medicine and Yale New Haven Medical Center, Southern Illinois University, University of Tennessee and Indiana University.

Simic will hold the rank of professor and will receive an annual salary of \$39,500.

IFC boosts OSA budget 3.5 percent

The Office of Student Advocacy (OSA) was last week's biggest winner in continuing Incidental Fee Committee (IFC) budget hearings.

OSA netted \$50,105.45, an increase of \$1,389.59, or about 3.5 percent. Originally OSA requested \$50,025.45. The extra funds were requested for a potential director's salary increase. Next year's ASUO president will decide the exact salary.

A few programs took cuts in next year's budgets. The International Education Center decreased its budget by about \$500. Next year it will receive \$3,820.79.

MEChA, the Chicano student union, lowered its budget request \$1,002.16 for next year and requested a total of \$3,290.10. The Political Science Student Union was awarded \$96.50, down \$83.50 from its original request.

The remaining programs presenting budgets were given increases from last year's figures. The Gerontology Association received \$2,711.93, an increase of \$1,099.21, or about 1.5 percent. The group originally requested \$4,465.38.

Music Steering Committee members were granted \$4,250 for next year, an increase of about \$2,000. The Graduate Student Organization Center for Educational Policy and Management got a \$150 increase over last year. It received a total of \$250 after initially requesting \$475.

The Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance Student Advisory Council was granted its original request of \$275 while 3-D, a group facilitating multi-ethnic participation, garnered \$1,937.90, \$191.79 more than last year's budget.

The Model United Nation's budget was raised \$62.75 this year to a total of \$703. A new group, the English Graduate Student Council, was allotted \$1,224.

Physics professor joins new council

CSTD is a non-profit, non-governmental institution made up of American scientists, engineers, physicians, technical managers and social scientists.
