

Holocaust Day to be held

Members of the Jewish Student Union will celebrate Holocaust Day Thursday with exhibits, films and a candlelight memorial service for the victims of the Holocaust.

The ceremony will be held at 8 p.m. on the lawn near Susan Campbell Hall.

Other events will include a photograph exhibit and information table in the EMU Main Lobby from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Holocaust-related films will be shown, beginning at 10 a.m. with "From the Ashes," which will be repeated at 1 p.m. in the EMU room to be posted. "Night and Fog" will be shown at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. and "L'Oraim" will be presented at 11:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m.

LCC offers hot tub course

A hot tub technology workshop will be offered by Lane Community College (LCC) at South Eugene High School Thursday, from 7 to 10 p.m.

Workshop instructor Stephens Harter, a licensed homebuilder who has built several hot tubs, will lecture on hot tub design, wood selection, techniques for making slaves and outboard equipment such as heaters, pumps and chlorinators. Harter will also discuss manufactured tubs, kits and materials.

Tuition for the non-credit adult education workshop is \$4, which includes a \$1 rental fee. Registration will take place during the three-hour session.
