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SEARCH proposal deadline draws near

Thinking about teaching a SEARCH class summer or fall term? Better start turning those thoughts into action.

Andrew Freeman, SEARCH director, says although the deadline to turn in a class proposal is June 1, the administrative process takes awhile and it's good to get started early.

Freeman suggests prospective instructors bring their class proposals to the SEARCH office,

Suite 1, EMU, for discussion. Instruction must then fill out a form explaining the class and obtain a faculty sponsor.

The next step is to organize the class itself. Freeman includes class structure, resources, testing, outline and syllabus as things to consider.

Often, says Freeman, SEARCH instructors "teach their classes in a traditional manner." Bill May, a SEARCH instructor seminar leader, is available to "work with instructors in learning non-traditional options for education," says Freeman.

For summer session, teachers can organize either eight or 10-week classes. Probably, Freeman says, they can teach four-week classes, but he is still checking.

He's not optimistic about having a large number of classes this summer; "I'll be happy if we get 10." He is interested in getting recreation-type classes like Frisbee or bike touring.

Freeman suggests those interested in teaching fall term SEARCH classes "set up at least the administrative part now. It's hard to get a hold of sponsors before fall term and we have a deadline a couple weeks before the term."

Dong show debut today
