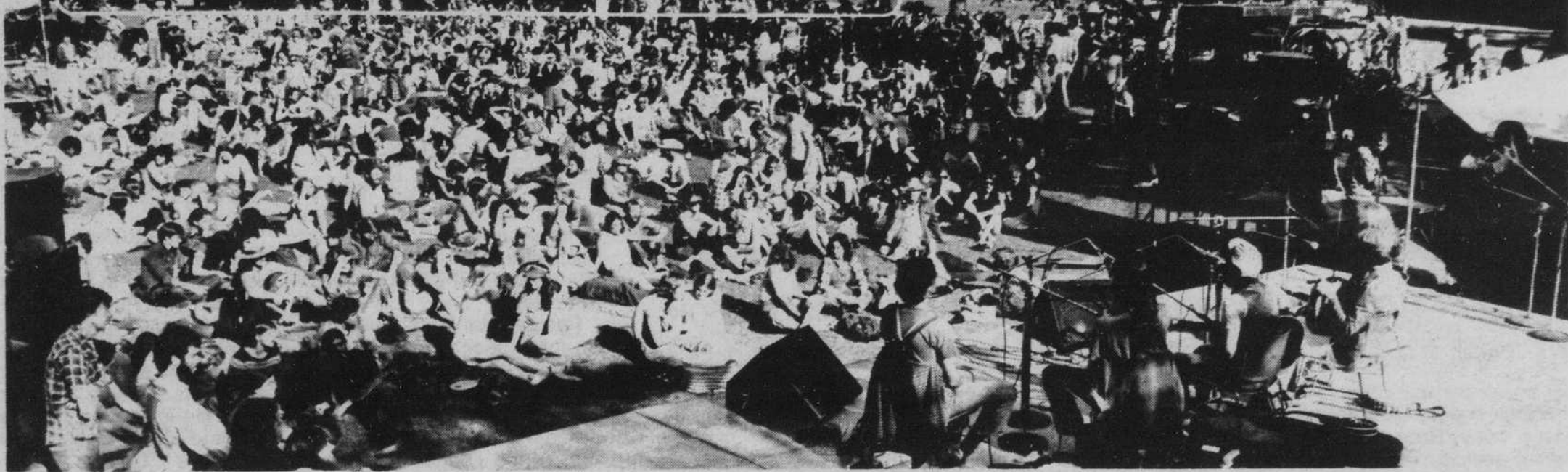

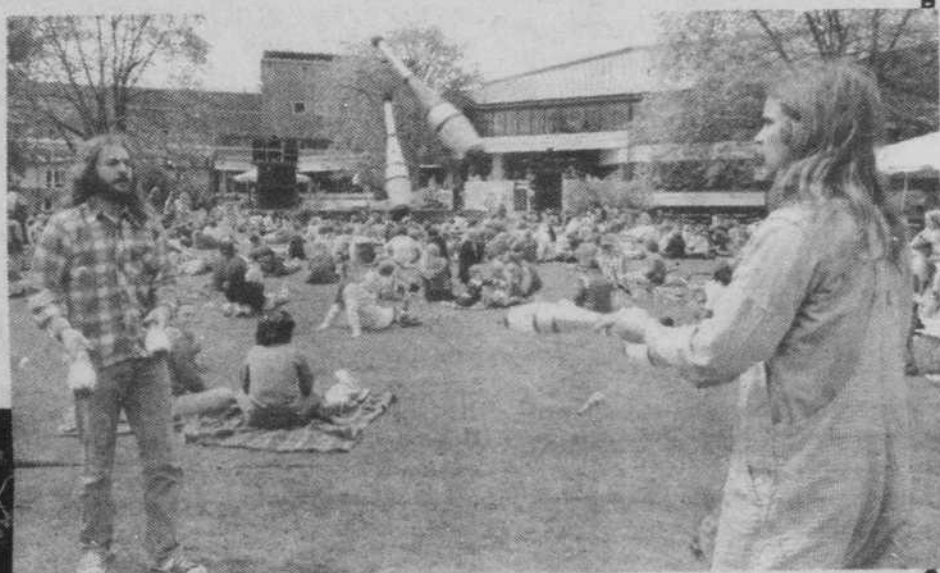

Travel, variety, sun highlight summer school

The University is expecting about 7,300 students to enroll in this year's summer session, according to Ron Trebon, business manager of the summer school program.

That figure is slightly more than last year's enrollment of 7,160. About 50 percent of that number will be new summer session students, says Trebon.

The summer session has several aspects which make it different from the usual school term.

For one, students may attend without being formally admitted to the University. However, those students intending to use

the credit earned during the summer to meet University requirements for a degree must be formally admitted. For those not in school now, an admission form must be submitted to the Office of Admissions no later than May 19.

Students already in school simply have to submit a registration request, available from the summer session office, 64 PLC. The cards must be filed by May 26 for courses that begin June 20.

Summer session courses vary in length from one to eight weeks long. Undergraduates can take no more than 21 hours and graduate students, no more than 15.

For out-of-state students, the summer session offers some relief for the pocket-book. No out-of-state tuition is charged for

the term.

Dormitory housing is also available during the summer. Information on housing arrangements can be obtained from the Housing Office.

Summer session times schedules will be available May 15 from the registrar's office, Oregon Hall, or from the summer session office.

Several special events are offered in conjunction with this year's summer session, says Trebon. They are:

- Carnival Theatre High School Apprentice Program June 20-Aug. 11 for drama students ages 13 to 18.
- 31st Annual High School Music Summer Session, June 18-July 1, for music students ages 13 to 18 years.

• Ninth Summer Festival of Music, featuring lectures and concerts by Conductor Helmut Rilling of Stuttgart, Germany.

• Oregon Institute of Marine Biology, June 19-Aug. 12, at Charleston. Marine biology courses are offered.

• Summer Session at the Italian University for Foreigners, July 3-Aug. 25. Held at Perugia, Italy, the session features courses in Italian language, literature, history, philosophy, music, theater and art.

• Oregon Summer Program in Austria and Germany, June 20-Aug. 12. Courses are offered in second-year German language and German culture and civilization.
