Expert to talk on American economy tonight

"The End of the American Empire: Underlying Causes and What Lies Ahead" will be presented tonight at 8 in the EMU, room to be posted.

American Economist Edward Boorstein will lecture, as sponsored by the May Day Cultural Committee and the EMU Cultural Forum.

Boorstein has worked for the Federal Reserve Board, for the post World War Two U.S. military government in Germany and more recently, for Cuba's Ministry of Foreign Commerce. In Chile, he was an assistant to President Allende's economic advisor, for many months prior to the coup in 1973.

Currently, Boorstein is doing research on aspects of the economic and urban problems in the United States.
