

Graduates show photos

The Photography at Oregon Gallery, University Museum of Art, will sponsor the works of two master of fine arts candidates in the gallery through June 11.

Susan Lloyd and Charles True, graduate teaching fellows in graphic arts and photography at the University, will show a variety of work, including photograms, photographic/mixed-media collages, photo-etchings, gum bicarbonate and cyanotype prints, photo-silkscreens and photo-lithographs.

Lloyd's images are concerned with "the exploration of man's search for something beyond himself. Most of the images are religious/spiritual/mystical in nature." Her work has been shown at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology as a part of an exhibit of photographs from "Women See Men," a book in which her work appears. Her work also has been exhibited at the Eugene Public Library, Southwest Center of Photography, Austin, Texas and Image Point Gallery, Eugene.

True received his bachelor of fine arts degree at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. With his current work, he attempts to crystallize talize personal emotional and psychological events. Concerned with linear and tonal polyrhythms, True often incorporates hand-written cryptographic elements in his images.

True has exhibited twice in the annual "Photography in Eugene" show, in the Artists of Oregon show sponsored by the Portland Art Museum and in an individual show at Maude Kerns Art Center.

The photo gallery is open free of charge during the regular museum hours, noon to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Sunday. Exhibitions are funded in part by the Oregon Arts Commission, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the City of Eugene, Transient Room Tax Fund and by private contributions.

Jazz cheaper for students

The annual Newport Jazz Festival in Nice, France, will be held this summer from July 6 to 16, and a special student tour will offer young Americans a way to attend this international music event.

A choice of two 15-day itineraries is offered from New York. The July 5-July 20 program features roundtrip Air France airfare to Paris with train connections to Nice, student hotel accommodations with meals and tickets to the daily evening concerts, for \$650. The alternative July 2-18 program includes roundtrip airfare to Nice, accommodations at the Hotel Westminster and concert tickets for \$774.

Jazz greats who will perform at this year's Grande Parade du Jazz include Count Basie, Dizzy Gillespie, Teddy Wilson, Sarah Vaughan, Gerry Mulligan and numerous other American and European artists. Performances will be at the 200-acre gallo-roman gardens of the Cimiez amphitheater.

Playwright sets child's seminar

A nationally-known children's playwright will offer a special four-week graduate seminar in children's theatre at the University this summer.

Joseph Robinette, winner of the 1976 Charlotte Choppening Cup awarded annually by the American Theatre Association to an outstanding writer of children's plays, will conduct the five-credit seminar June 20 through July 14.

While he is on campus, Robinette also will direct his own musical play, "The Princess, the Poet and the Little Gray Man," which will play at the University's Carnival Children's Theatre July 11-13 and 18-20.

Robinette's seminar, called "Play Production for Young Audiences," will cover techniques of developing material, acting, directing, and producing plays for and by children for child audiences.

According to Marya Bednerik, University theatre director, the seminar is especially well suited to public school teachers, recreation directors and actors interested in children's theatre.

Robinette is a professor of speech and theatre at Giasboro (NJ) State College. He has written or co-authored 15 plays, six of which are children's musicals. He has directed more than 40 productions and has been a drama critic for the Hawaii Tribune-Herald.
