Ducks put on impressive show in destroying Southern Oregon

While Buzz Summers' predicted outcome materialized, some unexpected surprises developed.

Eventually, the Oregon men's tennis coach watched as his team swept every match of the afternoon to blank Southern Oregon State College 9-0 at the covered courts.

The result was beyond expectations.

"I did not think we could win every match. I thought we could win with the players we had but not all the matches. I expected one or two losses but I was not sure who would lose," explained Summers.

As it turned out no one was a loser. After grabbing all six singles, despite three close matches, the Ducks swept the doubles, losing only eleven games in the three matches. It was the latter that

Summers was most pleased with.

"I was especially pleased with the doubles. I think a few of our players were a little nervous in the singles," which accounted for three matches going the full three sets.

The day's longest match saw Oregon's Tom Goldman outlast SOC's Jay Zizchke 5-7, 7-5, 7-6, and fight off six match points in the process. Goldman shrugged off five of those in the second set when he was down 5-3 before rallying. He took the win with a 5-3 advantage in the third set tiebreaker.

The other two three-set matches resulted in the Ducks' Jim Lowell winning 3-6, 6-1, 6-1 while his teammate, Mike DeMong, rallied past Rick Collins 4-6, 6-3, 6-1.

As for the all impressive doubles, Holman and Demong teamed to lose only two games, while Lowell and Eric Lehto were winning 6-4, 6-0. Goldman and

Tom Greider accounted for the other triumph.

For Greider, his two matches were unexpected. Originally Summers planned on resting Greider and Jim Wilson. But when Russ Childers became ill, Greider was thrust into the number one spot. He responded with a 6-3, 6-4 win over Southern Oregon's Jack Griffin.

"Childers has had bronchitis and he became rather dizzy during warmup, so Greider played for him," explained Summers, who cited Greider and Lehto, a 6-1, 6-4 singles winner, as "the two who played the best tennis today."

The loss dropped Southern Oregon to 11-13 on the year, which has seen them lose their first nine matches before winning eleven of fourteen matches, prior to yesterday's encounter.

Oregon now gears for the Northern Division championships scheduled May 12-14.

USOC measure passes Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate passed without dissent Monday a measure that would broaden the U.S. Olympic Committee's (USOC) charter enabling it to serve as coordinator for all the nation's amateur athletics with authority to spend \$30 million in the 12 months beginning Oct. 1.

The measure would end years of fighting between such sports organizations as the Amateur Athletic Union and the National Collegiate Athletic Association. It now goes to the House where it is expected to be introduced soon.

The Senate bill would give the U.S. Olympic Committee the power to recognize eligible amateur sports organizations as national governing bodies for any

sport included on the program of the Olympic and Pan-American Games.

The legislation would empower the American Arbitration Association

to settle questions on athletes' rights and hassles between groups seeking recognition as national governing bodies in specific sports.

Oregon signs three to wrestling letters

Three wrestlers have signed letters-of-intent to attend Oregon next year.

Adam Cuestes, whom coach Ron Finley calls a "blue chipper in every coaching circle," is a two-time California state champion in the 105 pound weight division. Last year he had a 41-1 record at Merced, Calif., High School, and

for his career he was 152-7. Three times he won the United States Western Regional Freestyle Championship in his weight division and was the named the outstanding wrestler in the meet held in Eugene this summer.

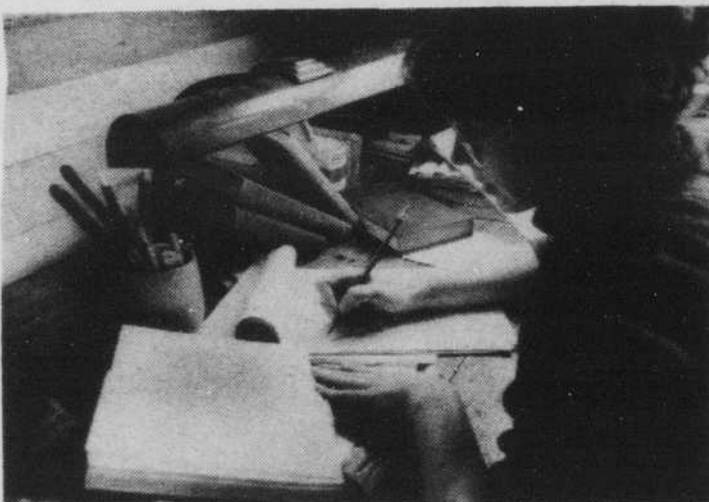
Finley and Cuestes will wrestle in the 118-pound division for Oregon.

Two Oregon preps were the other signees. Larry Hampton of Newberg High won all 32 matches he appeared in this past season, in the process taking the 177-pound AAA title.

Mike Rouse, who wrestled at Creswell High, also won all of his matches last year, 36 in all, to win the AA state 148 pound title.

Finley said Rouse likely will wrestle at 158 pounds, filling the shoes of graduating senior Dan Hollembaek, last year's fourth place Pac-8 finisher. Hampton will likely fill in for Randy Besaw, who also graduated after finishing second in the Pac-8 meet. Cuestes will wrestle at 118 pounds, as last year's starter Norm Knight will be redshirted next year.

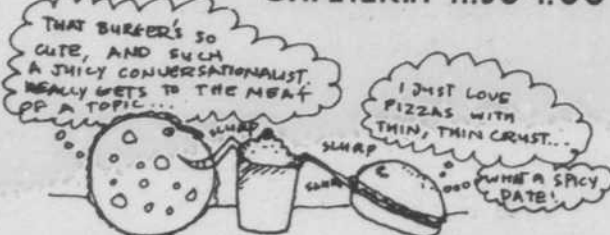
