Exchange students, ages 11 to 16 years, live with families on the West Coast and practice English, learning American way of life and culture. Requirements for host families include having a child approximately the same age as the exchange student.

The program was founded in Mexico in 1959 by the Rev. Placid Reitmeier, an American priest. Central office personnel in Mexico City are assisted by volunteer couples in Central America, Mexico, Canada and the United States, who coordinate the work locally, interview families and select students.
