Men's tennis bounces back for third division tourney

PULLMAN, Wash. — After dropping its first two matches of the weekend, Oregon's men's tennis team rallied to beat Seattle University, 6-3, here Sunday in the final round of the Pac-8 Northern Division Tennis Championships.

The Ducks, who had lost to Washington and Washington State the two previous days, won four of the six singles matches and two of three doubles contests.

Jim Wilson, Oregon's number

one singles player, tipped SU's Kirk MacGregor in three sets, 3-6, 7-5, 6-4 while Russ Childers, Eric Lehto, and Tom Goldman also won.

Wilson and Goldman won the number two doubles match, while Lehto and Lowell captured the number three pairs.

Oregon finished in third place in the division, and ended the regular season with an 8-10 record. Washington captured the division's top spot, followed by

WSU in second place.

The Ducks conclude the year with the Oregon Spring Championships this weekend.

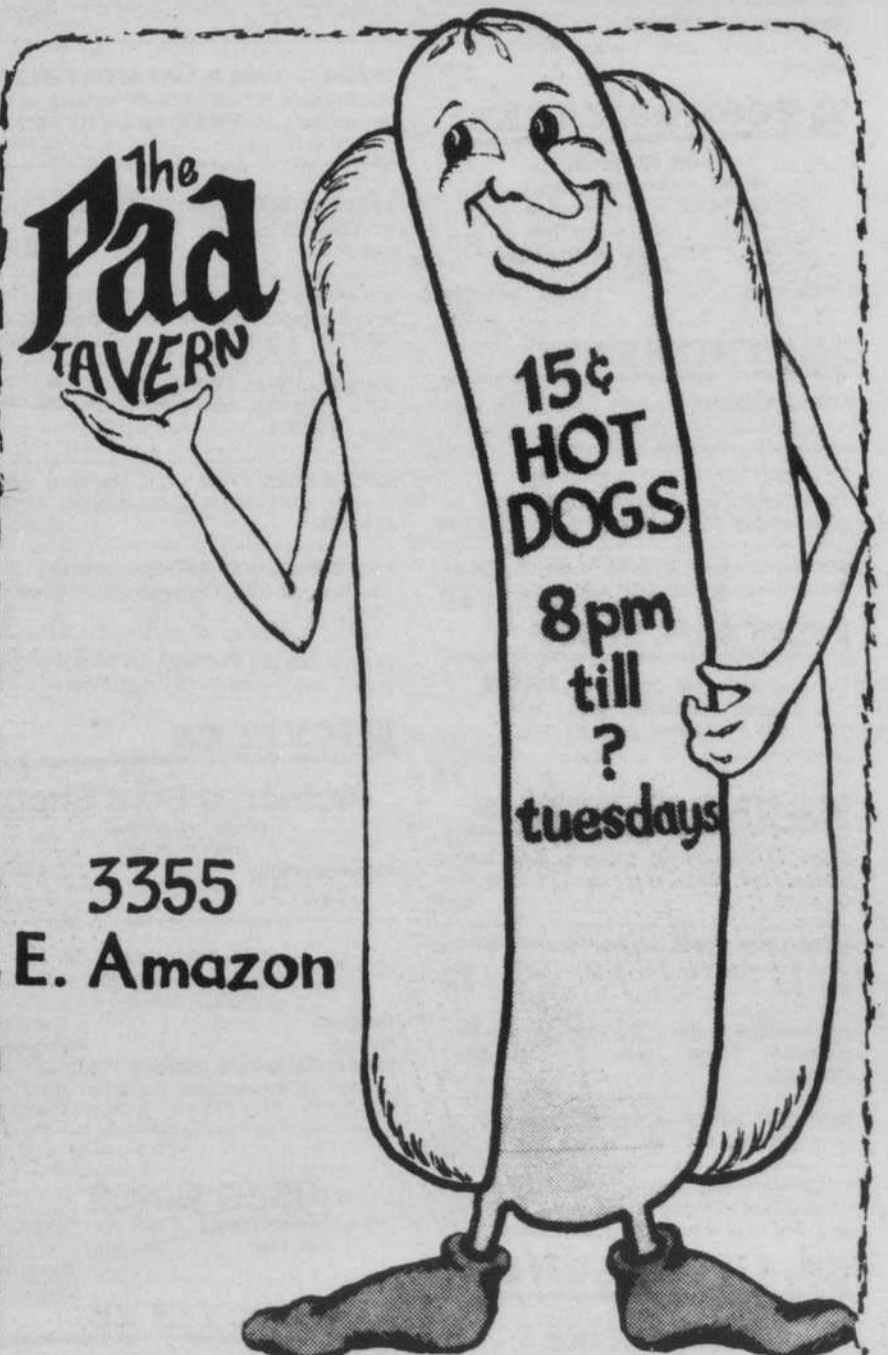
