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Pac-10 ADs and advisers to vote on new bowl selection method

WALNUT CREEK, Calif. (AP) — A new method of selecting the Pacific-10 Conference representative in the Rose Bowl will be voted upon by the conference's council of faculty advisers and athletic directors at a meeting in Corvallis, Or., May 20.

Pac-10 Executive Director Wiles Hallock said Wednesday an approval is expected. He said the addition of Arizona and Arizona State to the conference next fall resulted in the need for a new formula and that athletic directors at a meeting April 27-28 decided to use the same method that was used when the conference expanded from five to eight teams.

"Basically, this is the same plan that was used prior to 1972, when we as a conference decided to go to round-robin," Hallock said.

With 10 teams in the Pac-10, the 1978 schedule will not provide for home-away games for each team with each other conference member. Some teams will play eight conference games, some seven. For this reason, the number of conference losses and ties, rather than the number of conference victories will decide

the conference champion.

Should two teams have the same number of losses, ties or a combination of the two and one of these teams has beaten the other, then that team will be champion.

But if the two teams with the best records did not play one another or played a tie game, the champion will be chosen on the basis of points for overall records. Conference victories will count four points, nonconference victories three points, conference ties will count two points and nonconference ties 1½ points.

Should the two teams end up with identical point totals, then the team which last represented the conference in the Rose Bowl would be eliminated. But if those two teams happen to be the two new members from Arizona, a vote of the athletic directors would decide which would go to the Rose Bowl for the first time.

"Since neither of them has been to the Rose Bowl before," Hallock said, "it would be the only time that the conference would require a vote from the athletic directors for selection."

Los Angeles might get 1984 Olympics

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — The executive board of the International Olympic Committee was reported Tuesday ready to recommend the award of the 1984 Olympic Games to Los Angeles "but on one controversial condition."

IOC sources said Los Angeles would be required to sign a contract drafted by the IOC within a specific period, possibly 21 days. If Los Angeles did not comply, new bids would then be invited for the games.

That was the uneasy position after days of wrangling between the lawyers of the two sides. The dispute came down to the wording of Rule 4 in the Olympic rules.

This rule says the host city and the National Olympic Committee (NOC) of the host country are jointly responsible for running the games to the satisfaction of the IOC.

It says the following: the NOC and the city chosen shall be jointly and severally responsible for all commitments entered into and shall assume complete financial responsibility for the organization of the games.

Los Angeles lawyers have argued the inclusion of a third party — the NOC of the United States would mean a yielding of the city's economic sovereignty.

If the IOC granted Los Angeles the games, conditional on the signing of a contract, it would throw the onus of failure on the California city.

But Councilman John Ferraro — one of the six-man team which is to present Los Angeles' bid Wednesday — said 21 days would not be enough for the City Council to consider such a thing.

"We would need more like 90 days," Ferraro said.

IOC members have indicated they would not be ready to wait that long.

Los Angeles — the only bidder for the games — submitted its application six months ago to comply with a stipulated deadline. It was then sent a form of contract which it would be required to sign, but sent back a draft contract drawn up by its own lawyers. This is what is causing the rift.

Faller qualifies in weightlift

Chester Faller took three firsts, one second and four thirds last weekend in the Washington Wheelchair Games. Faller, a University student, competed for the Eugene Kamikazes in the Games.

Faller beat the national qualifying mark in the heavyweight weight lift by pressing 275 pounds, a personal best for him. The national qualifying mark is 235 pounds.

Faller also combined with three members of the Northwest Streakers to take home victories in the 440 relay and the mile relay. In the latter, the group broke a national record by 37 seconds. Jim

Hernandez, Steve Chess, Jim Martinson and Faller broke a Washington record in the 440 relay, clocking 1:23.5. The team broke the national mile relay time of 7:31 by finishing in 6:54.

Faller won his second place in the 100 yard hurdles and took his thirds in table tennis, 100 yard dash, shot put and 40 yard wheelie.

Because of the bad conditions, Faller said he is requesting \$75 from the athletic department to travel to California in an attempt to meet more qualifying marks in the California Wheelchair Games this coming weekend.
