Organization seeks to save area buildings

Have you ever seen an interesting building and wanted to know a little about its history? Have you ever seen a building torn down to make room for a highway or a parking lot? If you can answer yes to either of these questions, you might wish to use the services of a new organization.

The organization, Save Our Structures, was organized to provide a place where individuals could easily obtain information about Eugene's architectural history, and where individuals interested in historic preservation could combine their knowledge and efforts in attempts to save historically valuable buildings and other structures.

The organization plans to offer the following services:

- It will compile bibliographies of books and pamphlets on the history of architecture, restoration, and federal, state and local laws governing preservation.
- It will aid individuals who want to research their own homes or other buildings in the community.
- It will seek designs for plaques to mark historic sites and will research plaque designs used in other communities.
- It will provide information on house moving for individuals who wish to use this method of saving historic buildings.
- It will provide emergency aid for buildings that are threatened.

Membership is open to anyone who is interested in preservation of buildings. No previous knowledge of historic preservation is necessary for membership.
