

Attorney relieved cop hired to kill him

SEATTLE (AP) — Attorney Roger M. Leed considers himself fortunate. He could be dead.

But a "contract" for Leed's murder was never completed, when the killer for hire turned out to be an undercover policeman.

"We were just fortunate they went to police undercover agents instead of somebody who would have done it," says Leed, a 38-year-old father of three and champion of environmental causes.

Leed found out in April that someone was paid to kill him.

Two men were subsequently arrested and charged with hiring a "hit man." Leed, who specializes

in consumer fraud cases, says he fears the two may have been carrying out orders for someone higher-up.

"I do the best I can not to let it prey on my mind," says Leed. "But in terms of cold fact, the person or persons who initiated this have not been apprehended, and there's no reason to believe they won't try again."

But Leed says there is no way to protect himself against another attempt on his life.

"I suspect carrying a gun would be against my principles and of no real use against professional killers. . . . It sounds like Chicago in the '30s."

He says his children feel threatened and his wife lives in a constant state of anxiety when he comes home late from work.

"As far as I know, they hired someone to do this, gave him traveling money and left it up to him. The police showed me the gun, a pistol with a silencer, just like the movies," Leed says.

Newport Beach undercover detective John Simon posed as the hit man. He told Leed he was paid \$5,000 and promised another \$10,000 after the murder.

To collect the remainder, the policeman persuaded Leed to play dead.

Leed accompanied Simon to a

wooded area at the Seattle Police Academy. His face and head daubed with red makeup to resemble blood, Leed sprawled in a bush, closed his eyes and "posed" for photographs.

Leed gave the agent identification and family pictures from his wallet to further prove his death.

On April 12, Leed "vanished" and a missing persons report was filed. Actually, he visited friends and relatives on the East Coast.

He reappeared in Seattle April 24, after Joseph Bogg, 62, Beverly Hills, and Joseph W. Serino, 49, Mission Viejo, were charged. They were bound over to Superior Court in California to stand trial

June 6.

Both pleaded innocent to charges of conspiracy to commit murder and solicitation for murder. They also are alleged to have wanted Mrs. Bogg killed. Bogg and Serino are free on bond.

Leed said he did not know Bogg or Serino, but he was the attorney for more than 200 Washington state residents who filed a consumer fraud lawsuit against American Land Research, a Beverly Hills land company that employs the two men.

A Seattle judge ruled the land company had committed fraud, and Leed said the judgment could amount to more than \$1 million.
