Emerald announces 1978-79 staff selections

Staff selections for 24 Oregon Daily Emerald editorial positions were announced Sunday by Emerald Editor Tom Wolfe.

Managing Editor Melody Ward will help supervise the paper's daily operations and direct personnel. Ward, a humanities major, has worked at the Emerald as associate editor of departments and schools and as a reporter with the Emerald, the Southwester (The Southwestern Oregon Community College paper) and the Coquille Valley Sentinel. In addition she has radio experience with KBDF, KYNG, and KWRO stations.

News Editor Marv Fjordbeck will edit all

news copy and supervise the Emerald's copy desk staff. Fjordbeck, a journalism junior, worked as a staff member of the University Sports Information Office this year as recipient of the University Lichtman Scholarship. Previously, he worked as Emerald Sports Editor and as a staff writer for the Klamath Falls Herald and News. This summer he will work on the Portland Oregonian copy desk as an intern.

Editorial Page Editor Glen Gibbons, a master's candidate in journalism, has written for the Walla Walla Union-Bulletin, the Salem Oregon Statesman, the Lebanon Express and the Albany Democrat-Herald. He taught Editorial Writing at Walla Walla

College last fall and edited the Emerald's entertainment section two years ago.

Eight associate editors were also selected to direct a staff of reporters in several news areas.

Mary Foran, a senior in General Literature and Spanish, will cover departments and schools, Keli Osborn, a journalism junior, will cover state systems and student services, Jim Allen, a journalism junior will cover ASUO.

Returning to their positions from last year will be Ann Treneman, state politics, Kevin Harden, community and Jock Hatfield, features. All three are journalism majors.

Bonny Williams, a junior in English and Secondary Education, was named in con-

sumer affairs and Catherine Seigner, a junior in journalism was named in environment.

The sports department will be staffed by Ken Sands, a sophomore in journalism and Mike Baer, a junior in political science.

Patrick Sullivan, a journalism junior, was named photo editor and Janice Brown, also a journalism junior, was named graphics editor.

Kathleen Monje, a journalism junior, was selected wire editor and Judy Petree, a journalism junior, will edit the entertainment supplement.
