

PSAF plans legal divestment assault

In May of 1977, University of Oregon and Portland State University students approved special referendums asking for State Board of Higher Education divestment of stocks and bonds of corporations operating in southern Africa.

State Board members voted for divestiture in November, 1977.

Thirteen months have passed since that first referendum at the University, and divestiture remains unrealized.

State Attorney General Jim Redden ruled in a May 1978 opinion that the State Board was not the trustee of endowment funds. According to his opinion, the investment role was given to the Oregon Investment Council by the 1975 Oregon Legislature.

But People for Southern African Freedom has actively sought State Board divestment of southern Africa-related stocks for more than a year... and won't give up.

Two members, Walt Sheasby and Roger Walke, attended an Oregon Investment Council meeting Wednesday to testify in favor

of divestment.

At its Tuesday night meeting, PSAF didn't expect a favorable vote by the OIC. "A month, maybe two months ago, the chairman of the Investment Council said divestment would happen over his dead body," said Bob Goulden.

Member Walt Sheasby nodded in agreement. "We really don't expect much out of them."

The PSAF plans to challenge any Investment Council decision against divestment in the courts, according to Goulden.

Diane Higgins, who is doing legal research for PSAF, is currently seeking plaintiffs for the anticipated suit against the Investment Council.

"We need plaintiffs, 'with standing,' or those whom divestment directly affects," Higgins said, adding that she is tracing scholarship students who are benefited by southern Africa-related investments.

PSAF also hopes to engage members of the State Board of Higher Education in their future suit against the OIC. According to Higgins, State Board member Jonathon Ater will propose such action at the next State Board meeting, June 30 in Portland.

But, Higgins said, "He won't take this upon himself. He's not going to be a plaintiff unless he can get other members of the Board to join him."

Sheasby added that PSAF may seek a change in the statutes that would put the State Board in control of the State System of Higher Education's endowment funds.

People for Southern African Freedom appear to be in for a long, hard struggle for divestment... be it in the Oregon Legislature or in Oregon's courts.

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Women's conference set

"Women on the Move" is the theme of this year's Oregon Women's Conference, to be held Friday through Sunday at Lewis and Clark College in Portland.

Several workshops focusing on women's lifestyles, education, careers, mental health, child care, religion, and participation in the political process are planned over the three day period.

The main goals of the conference are to provide a forum for the creation of awareness and support networks for all women in Oregon, education of women in the political process, and creation of action plans for implementation of the resolutions approved by the National Women's conference held earlier this year, according to

conference chairer Christine Fritz.

Friday evening the Oregon Women's Political Caucus will host a candidate's fair from 7:30 to 9:30, featuring booths and information on candidates for election.

Saturday morning, conference registration takes place at 9:00, followed by the keynote address, to be given by Laurie Shields, national coordinator of the Alliance for Displaced Homemakers at 10 a.m. Shields' speech is entitled "Older, Growing Bolder and Really Fit to be Tried."

Other Saturday events include a series of afternoon workshops, a reception and open showing for women artists in Oregon, and an evening theater production by Women's Energy.

Sunday, following a continental breakfast, there will be group and task force meetings for persons interested in organizing in groups on specific issues. The final activity will be a women's inspirational service, presented by the Coalition of Women in Religion.
