

Wilderness slides shown

"Winter Wilderness Adventures," an experimental 6-projector slide presentation, will be shown July 11 at 7 p.m. in Room 107 Lawrence, sponsored by the Outdoor Program.

New power head named

Jack Criswell, general manager of the Springfield Utility Board, has been elected president of the Northwest Public Power Association. Criswell's election came at NWPPA's 38th Annual Meeting, held last week in Jackson, Wyoming.

Criswell takes over NWPPA's top elected position at a time when the region's electric utilities are in the public's attention because of questions about future power supply, rates and proposals for a regional power plan.

NWPPA is the regional organization of 109 publicly-owned and consumer-owned electric systems in six Pacific Northwestern states, Alaska, British Columbia and the Yukon.

Community Ed. funded

The Northwest Community Education Development Center has received a grant of nearly \$140,000 to operate its program.

The \$138,865 grant is from the Charles Stewart Mott Foundation, Flint, Mich. This is the ninth year the foundation has provided the primary support for the University Center.

About \$90,000 of the grant will fund programs throughout the center, according to Director Larry Horyna. The rest of the funds will support similar services in Alaska, Montana and Washington.

Horyna says the center disseminates information about community schools and provides the schools themselves with technical assistance and training.

Family makes home-stay arrangements

Two Eugene doctoral candidates from Forli, Italy are organizing a home-stay program for Italian students who will visit Eugene during August.

Rick and Paola Price are making arrangements for 14 students aged 16 to 22 to stay for three or four weeks during August as part of a program introducing Italian students to the American way of life.

"We hope that families will accept them as a family member, rather than as a family guest," says Paola Price. "The families should not feel they have to entertain the visitors as guests."

Some placements have already been made, says Price, but about 11 still remain. In exchange, Price says, a son or daughter of host families may have the opportunity of staying a month with an Italian family. Many of the families have made such suggestions, she says.

Faculty club in transition

The Faculty Club is undergoing a name change and a face-lift. The house will be renamed in honor of George Collier, the University professor who built it as his home in 1886, when the state board approves the recommended change at its July meeting.

The City of Eugene has identified the house as a historical landmark. The Collier family heirs are providing some funds for renovation, according to University vice-pres. for administration and finance Ray Hawk. Part of the money will be used to repaint the house in its original colors: ocher with dark green trim.

A dedication ceremony will be held during the 1978-79 school year.

Gallagher, 44, has worked closely with the California labor movement for more than 10 years, according to Steven Deutsch, who has been acting LERC director, and wrote several union training manuals while at UCLA.

Gallagher will participate in several LERC programs this summer including a workshop on grievance administration and arbitration in community colleges July 30 through August 2, and a workshop for AFL-CIO central body officers and delegates Aug. 11-13.

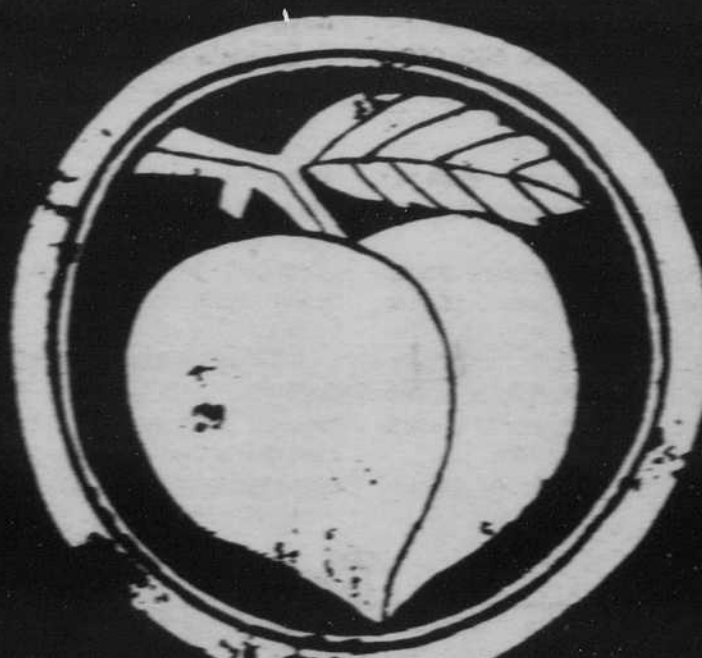
