Bovary attempts to escape her banal existence, dull husband and daily habits with her "new and exciting" lovers. "Charulata" is a rarely seen film by Satyajit Ray. In the late 1800s western thoughts of freedom and individuality are ruffling the age-old calm of Indian feudal society. Charulata is no longer capable of treading the beaten path of ideal woman who wants nothing of life but her husband's happiness.
