A focused problem-resolution workshop will be held at the Eugene Hotel Friday and Saturday, featuring nationally acclaimed therapist Lynn Segal.

In addition to learning focused problem-resolution, participants will learn about the latest developments and thinking on communication theory, uses of paradox, the interactional view, dealing with customers and non-customers and pessimism, among other topics.

Segal is presently chair of the Training Committee of the Mental Research Institute of Palo Alto, California. He has taught family and brief interactional therapy at Stanford University and the University of California, in addition to work in clinics and hospitals across the country.

Fees for the workshop are \$70 for professionals, and \$60 for medical and graduate students. The conference begins at 8 a.m. Friday, and participants are asked to be prompt.
