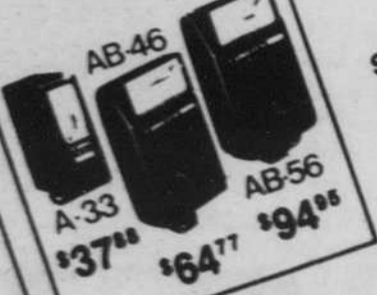

# Schools convene

To decide policy

Cooperation and collaboration are the themes of the national conference on the development of community-based education being held at the University this week.

It is important to work together, says Associate Prof. Ralph Rands of the University Center for Educational and Policy Management.

The debate between community colleges and community schools concerns the issue of which is to offer the educational services to a community. Rands, conference coordinator, is trying to bring both of these sides together.

"Community schools, which offer continued education for the community on a less formal basis, meet in churches, local schools and municipal buildings. Colleges are too formal and just another institution to bother with," Rands says.

He adds, "Community colleges feel they are 'tooled up' or more capable to bring community education to the people than are the community schools."

The four-day conference, is co-sponsored by the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges, the Northwest Community Education Development Center (NCEDC) and CEPM.

Major conference speakers include Paul Tremper, executive director of the National Community Education Association; Robert Hamill, associate superintendent, Oregon State Department of Education; Eldon Schafer, president, Lane County Community College and Larry Horyna, director of the NCEDC.

Rand describes the conference as a collection of 90 individuals, including graduate students who receive college credit by attending, leaders in the community school field, and community college presidents. The conference format is developed on a "speaker-reaction-discussion" system.

Each of the major topics, after being discussed by one of the conference speakers, is again discussed in small group sessions, where the conferees express their own opinions and receive feedback.

Several issues face the conference this week. John Hakanson, Clackamas Community College president, describes the implications of community education by advocating the consolation of community colleges and community schools whose "ultimate aim is community development."

Hakanson believes that with the help of community colleges and schools, forgotten potential resources such as the elderly, the handicapped, disenfranchised youth and "frustrated housewives" can be taught essential skills that will improve their communities. Each community must "identify their problems and work toward solving them," he says.

Other issues include the collaborative relationships needed by the community colleges and community schools on a national perspective, a description of the community-based educational institution, and a presentation by a group of speakers of various policies and types of funding.
