

## Speaker knocks strategy

Robert Aldridge will speak to participants in the Japan-America Student Conference as they observe "International Peace Day" on August 15.

Aldridge, an aerospace engineer, worked for sixteen years designing submarine-launched ballistic missiles and MIRVs for Poseidon submarines until he became convinced that Trident missiles were intended for first-strike use and resigned.

"Concealment of this first-strike strategy may be the greatest hoax ever perpetrated against the American people," says Aldridge in a recent article in *The Progressive* entitled, "First Strike: The Pentagon's Secret Strategy."

Also speaking at the Japan-America Student Conference on August 10 at 8 p.m. in the Valley River Inn will be the second in command of the Japanese Embassy in Washington, D.C., Kiyoshi Sumiya, "minister plenipotentiary."

Wednesday Jan Gault and Larry Clabby will pre-


sent a program of music for flute and piano at 12:30 p.m.
