

Employment helps ease full cash-flow problems

Getting to the University is one problem, having enough money to remain is another.

Since getting state or federal financial aid at this late date is next to impossible, a part-time job may be the only option.

One of the best places for a student to begin looking for a job is through the University's job placement office, located at 1511 Agate St. The office provides current listings of available jobs, job counseling and help with resumes.

Normally, the job market in Eugene is very tight — particularly at this time of year. But Camille Brockman, supervisor of the placement office, says the job situation has improved since last year.

Brockman says her office also does intensive "job development." The office staff of 14 persons actively seek out prospective employers for new openings. They also look for jobs to fill individual applicant's specific needs. Brockman says her office has been placing about 600 applicants per month.

The staff provides one-to-one counseling on how to get a job. They help students write resumes and give them pointers on approaching a potential employer. Brockman warns students that outside the university, the standards for appearance are different.

"It's critical in a job interview to look as neat and clean as possible," she says, adding that it is also important to let an employer know that you will be dependable.

Brockman expects about two hundred people to pass through the office this week. "But if they stick with us," she says, "we can place them."

Interested students should fill out an application as soon as possible at the office and survey the current listings. "However, if you don't find anything at first, don't give up," Brockman advises.

"New jobs open up every day so come in often."

The office is open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, including during the lunch hour. The office also stays open during vacation time.

Temporary, part-time and full-time jobs are all available. Temporary jobs range from babysitting and household work to yardwork.

On a part-time basis, fast food restaurant workers, motel maids and clerks are in demand. Jobs requiring particular skills or qualifications, such as hospital, secretarial or teaching positions, are also available part-time.

Kitchen work around the University offers another opportunity for students to handle financial problems.

"Pretty much anyone who wants a job in any of the kitchens can have one," says a food service spokeswoman. Opportunities are available both with the EMU and in the dormitories for \$2.44 an hour.

Volunteers can work anywhere from 20 to 80 hours a month, depending on how many students apply and how many hours they sign up for.

Students really desperate for funds can always sell their blood plasma. When things are rough it can bring in \$10 a session. Students wishing to sell their blood should contact the Eugene Plasma Corporation at 1071 Olive St.

The red blood cells are returned — only the plasma is used.

Students can also sell themselves to science. Graduates in the psychology department are always looking for someone who responds to stimuli and can fill out questionnaires.

Experiments cover such topics as noise, memory retention and the workings of various personality defects.

A panel of psychologists scrutinizes each experiment to make sure it in no way harms the victim. Working as a guinea pig can bring in anywhere from two to 10 bucks.

Full-time jobs may not appeal to students with heavy schedules but may prove ideal to part-time students and spouses putting their partners through school. Many of these are secretarial and

clerical civil service jobs both on and off campus.

Brockman says foreign students need to bring their visa with them when they apply for placement. Because of regulations regarding employment of aliens, the office must determine if the foreign student is qualified to work.

The placement office on campus works in cooperation with the Oregon State Employment Division. The office refers applicants to the same types of jobs as employment agencies do, except the service is free. The service is available to anyone, student or non-student, in the University area.

There is another State Employment office in Eugene, however, located at 432 West 11th Ave., which deals primarily in full-time positions.

The Casual Labor division, part of the city's employment office, matches people up to short-term agricultural jobs like fruit picking.

The Youth Employment Service, also located in Eugene's State Employment Office, will handle people 21 years or younger.

In Eugene, there are two temporary employment services, Manpower and Kelly services. These services place people in temporary labor or secretarial jobs for a fee from the employer.

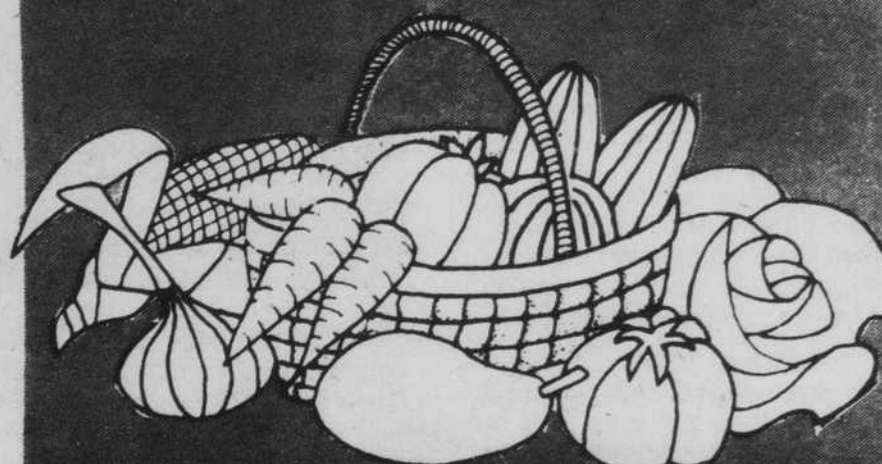
