

Veterans can get benefits

Oregon veterans attending school this fall may be entitled to state veterans' educational aid benefits to help pay the cost of their tuition, according to the Department of Veteran's Affairs.

H.C. Saalfeld, Veterans' Affairs Director, said the state benefit pays \$50 for each month of full-time, undergraduate studies, and up to \$35 a month for other studies, based on one month's for each month of military service to a maximum of 36 months.

Entitled are veterans of the Korean conflict, and veterans of service after July 1, 1958, who received the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal or the Vietnam Service Medal for service in overseas trouble spots and combat areas.

They must have been Oregon residents for one year immediately prior to their service, and they must be Oregon residents when they apply for the benefit. There is no application deadline.

Application may be filed with the school registrar or veterans' counselor, through a county service officer, or with the Department of Veterans' Affairs in Salem.

University women observe week of advocacy, action

The American Association of University Women's Eugene branch is joining the 43 other Oregon branches in observing AAUW Week through Sept. 30. Numbering 190,000 nationally, the AAUW promotes advocacy, action, research and lifelong learning for the advancement of women.

The Oregon division, through its legislative committee, will actively oppose the November ballot measure that would prohibit use of state funds for abortions. AAUW continues to advocate the right of individual choice in the determination of one's reproductive life.

The committee will also oppose both the property tax limitation measure and the measure that would diminish the effectiveness of the Land Conservation and Development Commission. The long-standing AAUW position supporting adequate funding of public education is the basis for the decision.

In the coming year the Eugene branch will be studying Women as Agents of Change, Politics of Food and Redefining the Goals of Education, as well as working to increase its contribution to the Educational Development Fund now nearing completion.

Any woman baccalaureate graduate of a four-year accredited school is eligible and welcome to join AAUW. Call 484-9986 or 686-9830 for membership information.

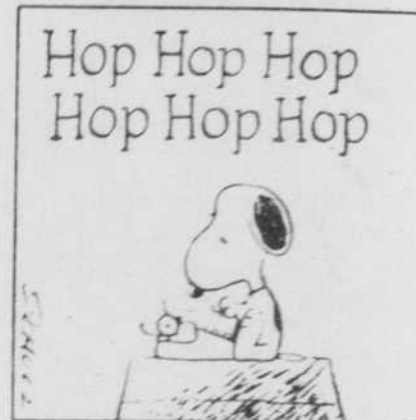
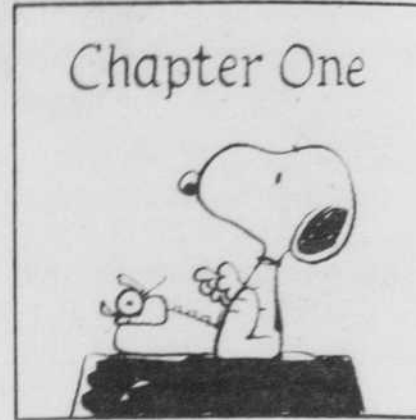
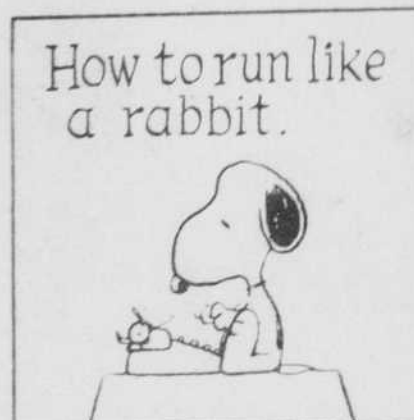
Electricians hold open house today

County provides home for women alcoholics

Lane County women alcoholics can seek assistance with their problems at Behanna House, Lane County's only such facility for women. The safe and structured home is run by the Lane

County Council on Alcoholism and gives the women a complete rehabilitation program.

The home provides residents with individual and group counseling, alcohol education, recreation, arts and crafts, and other group experiences, including shared responsibility for household maintenance, A.A. meetings, and community volunteer work. Some residents may be working or going to school during their stay.

Referrals to Behanna House are made by many social agencies and private practitioners, or on the initiative of the individual. Admittance is at the discretion of the director, and the period of residence varies with individual needs.

The EMU Board will meet today at 4:00 p.m. in the Forum. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss and decide space allocation concerning offices located in rooms 16D, 333 and 334 in the Erb Memorial Union. Occupants thereof should send representatives to this meeting.

The Lane County Budget Committee will hold a public hearing to discuss the supplemental budget on Tuesday, September 26.

The committee will discuss and take action on the allocation of \$2.5 million in cash carryover from the 1977-78 budget. The committee has already directed budget staff to use \$1.4 million of the cash balance to offset the decrease in expected O & C revenues.

The committee will also discuss approval of increased appropriation for items not anticipated in the Adopted Budget for 1978-79. There is \$1.1 million available from the cash carryover that could be allocated to capital projects, a contingency fund or to cover budget increase requests. The meeting is set for 1:30 p.m. in the Commissioners Conference Room, located in the Public Service Building or 125 E. 8th.
