

'Worst in U.S. history'

Air collision over city kills 141

SAN DIEGO (AP) — A packed Boeing 727 collided head-on with a small plane flown by a student pilot Monday, and both planes crashed in flaming fragments into a populous residential area. Officials said at least 141 persons were killed in the worst air disaster in U.S. history.

The pilots of both planes had been warned that they were on a collision course, and both acknowledged the warning, Federal Aviation Administration spokesman Bruce Chambers said in Los Angeles. The National Transportation Safety Board was analyzing cockpit tapes.

Burning debris from the Pacific Southwest Airlines jetliner rained down and ignited at least nine wood frame houses and two businesses.

Neighborhood residents tried to douse the flames with garden hoses, sending clouds of gray-black smoke billowing over the area.

The Federal Aviation Administration said none of the 136 persons aboard PSA flight 182 from Sacramento survived the collision. Both persons in the rented Cessna 172 were killed.

The PSA Boeing 727 was on a flight from Sacramento with a stop in Los Angeles, one of the airline's busiest commuter runs. The weather was clear with 10 miles visibility when the collision occurred at 9:03 a.m. The crash, 3,000 feet in the air, occurred three miles east of downtown Lindbergh Field, the jet's destination.

PORTLAND — Local police agencies in Oregon might be called upon to help track down military deserters when the Federal Bureau of Investigation leaves the problem up to the military police starting next month.

Alvin Hodges, FBI agent in Portland who has guided deserter hunts in Oregon, said the FBI has shifted its priorities.

He said the FBI has assisted in chasing about 50 deserters a year in Oregon. To encourage local police to help out, U.S. Defense Department officials have asked Congress to double the \$15 bounty.

WASHINGTON — Patricia Hearst's plea for clemency to President Carter was supported Monday by two California Congressmen, who submitted her petition.

The petition, submitted to the Justice Department's pardon attorney, was drafted by Miss Hearst's lawyer, George C. Martinez, and states that she has suffered an injustice at the hands of the authorities that is "arguably worse than any torture or threat of death."

The 38-page petition says, "We respectfully submit there can be no justice for Patricia Hearst as long as she is deprived of her freedom." U.S. Pardon Attorney John Stanish said it will take at least two months to review the case and another month or two before a recommendation is made on whether Miss Hearst should have her sentence commuted to the time she has served. Carter will have the final say.

Turkey may trade Oregonian

Negotiations are resuming toward the possible transfer to the United States of a former Oregon woman and other prisoners who are serving hashish smuggling sentences in Turkey.

They are JoAnn McDaniel, 33, formerly of Coos Bay, Ore.; Katherine Zen, 32, Lancaster, Wis. and Robert Hubbard, 38, San Antonio, Tex. Hubbard is the brother of Sandra Larkin, Oregon City, Ore. They were given 24-year sentences on their 1973 convictions of smuggling 265

pounds of hashish from Syria.

A U.S. State Department team headed by Robert Dalton resumed negotiations Monday in Ankara on a section of a prisoner exchange treaty. The United States hasn't agreed to a provision that the prisoners couldn't be paroled without being retried in the United States.

Negotiations also were held in Turkey last month in an effort to finish the treaty so Congress, which recesses Oct. 14, and the Turkish Grand Assembly can act on it.

The treaty, if enacted, also would affect two other American

prisoners in Turkish jails and seven Turkish prisoners in U.S. jails. They would be exchanged, if they consented, to continue serving their sentences in their own countries.

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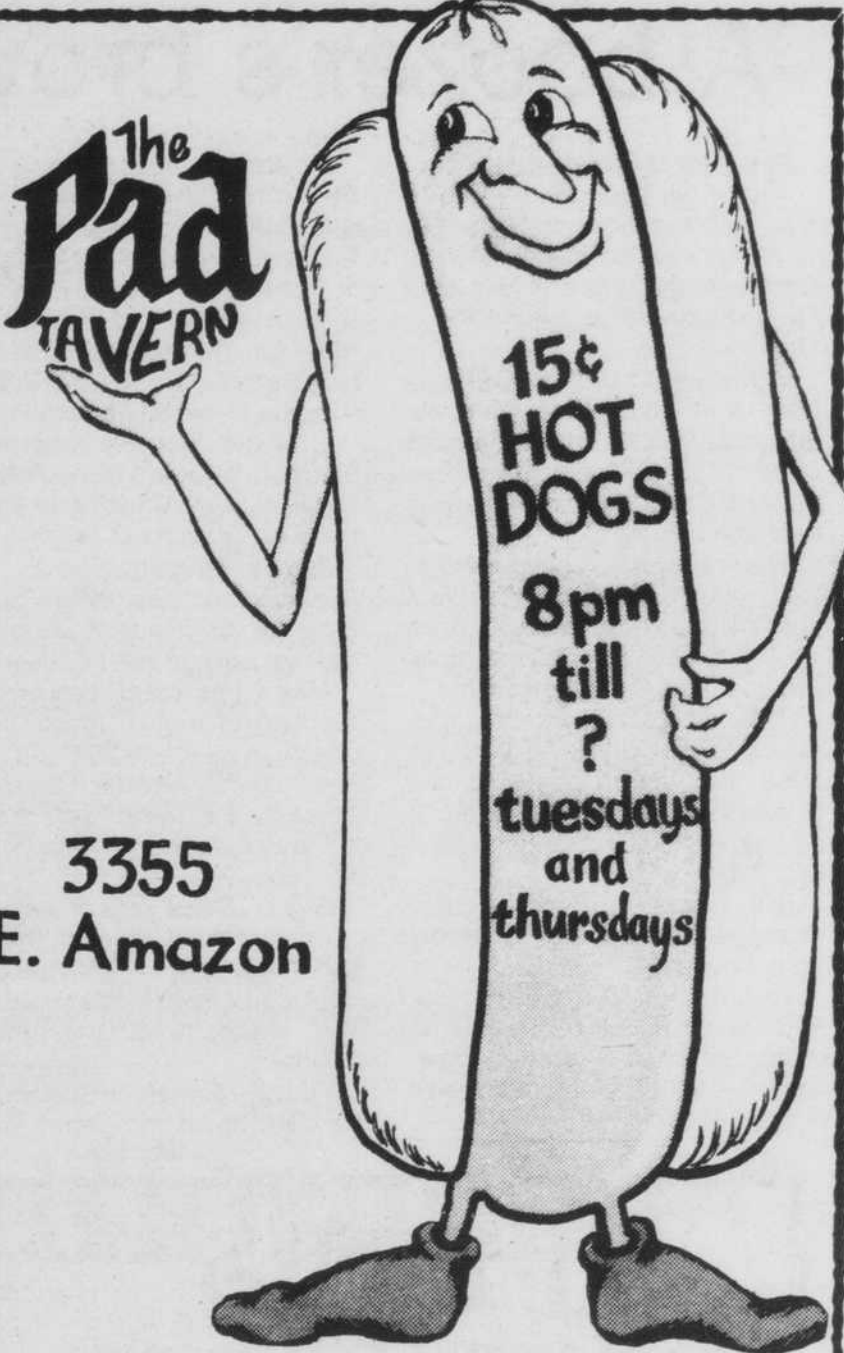
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
