or country music are offered seven nights a week. Cover charges depend on the band, but often during the week music is free.

The Place opened last January and has regularly brought in big-name shows.

The mood is loose, but not rowdy; the crowd is mixed and varies in age from 21 to 80. All drink prices raise 25 cents after 9 p.m. Drafts after 9 p.m. are 85 cents and bottled beer is \$1. Mixed drinks are served.

Drinks are priced two-for-one during happy hours, 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

The **Bib 'n Tucker** (Eugene Hotel), 222 E. Broadway, offers jazz every night except Blues Monday. There is usually no cover charge on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

The Bib 'n Tucker attracts a wide variety of people, with mood usually depending on entertainment.

A Eugene Hotel employee says that Upepo — a popular jazz band — usually has people dancing in the aisles and between the tables. "People just can't seem to sit still," she says.

DeFrisco's, 99 W. 10th Ave., Atrium Building, recently expanded and nearly doubled its seating capacity. The bar can now serve about 200 people.

It has pool tables, serves sandwiches and is the only tavern in the area with Heineken on tap. The atmosphere is comfortable and the clientele is widely mixed.

What was the Feed Mill is now **Biederbeck's**, 259 E. 5th Ave. Owner Doug Biederbeck says the new establishment is primarily a restaurant, even though the lounge is separated from the dining area.

He emphasizes that his customers are fairly knowledgeable about food and wine. The atmosphere is fairly sophisticated, but friendly.

Biederbeck says only good brands of liquor are used for drinks priced moderate to expensive.

The '70s are coming to a close, but the age has most certainly left its mark on Eugene — enter the discotheque.

For **O'Callahan's**, 440 Coburg

Rd., **Woodside Brewery**, 2165 W. 11th Ave., and **Pearl St. Station**, 412 Pearl St., the disco dance floor is a place to strut.

On weekends, O'Callahan's attracts people from every walk of life. If you manage to elbow your way to the bar, you'll find goblets of beer for \$1.25 as well as mixed drinks.

The Woodside Brewery is a tavern during the day and early evening. At night the pool tables are rolled off the dance floor, the mirrored ball on the ceiling starts spinning, the DJ cranks out tunes and — presto — we have a disco.

Pearl St. Station has an aura of sophistication, although the crowd is loose and casually dressed.

The place is dark, people boogie beneath a mirrored ball, and like all discos, the music never stops. The kitchen offers sandwiches, steaks, fish and a nightly special entree.

City opposes 2,4,5-T use

The Eugene City Council unanimously voted Monday night to express its "grave concern" to state and federal agencies over the continued use of herbicides as a forest management tool.

In a separate motion, the council also directed city staff to study requesting the Eugene Water and Electric Board to monitor the city water supply for the herbicide 2,4,5-T, the principal chemical in question.

Most of the testimony on the issue centered on the potential dangers of the herbicide, which is widely used in Oregon to thin brush around Douglas fir trees.

Councilman Scott Lieuallen, who brought the issue before the council as panel members Eric Haws and Tom Williams walked out, said although the idea was not new, recent evidence that the spray causes cancer, genetic damage and increased risk of miscarriage was sufficient to warrant council action.

Dr. Bill McNulty, whose Beaverton lab recently reported that small amounts of 2,4,5-T cause miscarriages in Rhesus monkeys, said his test results "very closely parallel" the effects of the substance on

human pregnancies.

He said "at least some pregnant women are at risk" from the use of the chemical.

Dr. George Strisinger called 2,4,5-T "one of the most poisonous" substances known to humans, and added that studies by the Environmental Protection Agency show that even in amounts from 5 to 10 parts per trillion, the chemical has been detected in the fatty tissue of beef and wildlife. That, he says, "poses a hazard."

But Dr. John Wallstad, a forest ecologist with Weyerhaeuser Company, countered those claims saying that when properly used, 2,4,5-T is no health hazard.

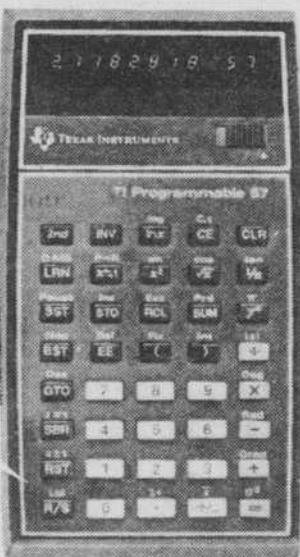
He said the substance rarely ends up in the food chain, and even then it is in insignificant amounts. He said his company only uses registered herbicides, which are carefully tested by trained and licensed crews.

"Great care and common sense" are always used when applying the sprays, he said.

Marla Gillham of the Northwest Coalition for Alternatives to Pesticides, said that prices for manual brushing have been "way, way over-exaggerated," and that people in need of work will perform the labor.
