

Plan ahead — go north when sun goes out

"I will smother the whole world in the dead blackness of midnight; I will blot out the sun, and he shall never shine again; the fruits of the earth shall rot for lack of light and warmth, and the peoples of the earth shall famish and die, to the last man!" — Mark Twain, "A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court."

A rare total eclipse of the sun will occur over the Northwest during the early morning hours of next Feb. 26, and University students are already getting ready for it. This solar eclipse is so unusual because it happens, on the average, only once every 360 years.

Solar eclipses occur because the moon, by coming directly between the earth and sun, blocks off the sunlight. A lunar eclipse results when the earth's shadow falls across the moon, cutting off sunlight ordinarily reflected from the moon's surface.

The eclipse will last less than three minutes and will be shorter in time as one moves further away from the central line of totality (the path the eclipse will take as it passes over the earth). In the United States the width of the path of totality will exceed 170 miles.

The path will begin its trek at sunrise, over the North Pacific Ocean. It will cross the northwestern United States (Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana North

Dakota), central Canada (Manitoba and Ontario), Hudson Bay and Baffin Island.

Cities within its swath in Oregon are Salem, Albany, Baker and Portland.

Yakima, Pasco, Walla Walla, Colfax and Vancouver, Washington; Missoula, Butte, Helena, Great Falls and Glasgow, Mon-

tana; Williston and Minot, North Dakota, and Brandes and Winnipeg, in Manitoba will also get to see the sun disappear.

The University's Outdoor Program, in an effort to encourage people to view the February eclipse, is coordinating efforts in the Northwest with other outdoor-oriented

programs. They will locate areas offering good vantage points.

Under the direction of Gary Grimm, the coordinator of the Outdoor Program, the "Moonshadow 1979" project will coordinate these wilderness trips.

Several plans are being developed by Grimm and other individuals involved in the "Moonshadow" project.

- Laid Back trips for those individuals who are just interested in seeing the eclipse. These excursions will last one to three days.

- Instruction Base Camp trips will be directed towards people who want to both see the eclipse and learn some winter wilderness skills. These trips will last from two days to two weeks.

- Winter Expedition trips will be for people who want to travel in the winter backcountry. These expeditions will last from one week to one month.

Ideal locations, pin pointed out by the "Moonshadow" project, will be at high elevations where the sun shines much of the time.

Grimm hopes to persuade the Oregon Board of Education to close schools on Feb. 26 in order to allow students the opportunity to view the eclipse. In addition, he hopes teachers throughout the Northwest will spend some class time discussing and informing their students on eclipses so they will be more prepared for the event.
