

Men's group shows film

"Men's Lives," a documentary about growing up male in this society is being presented today at 3:30 p.m. in Studio C of the Instructional Media Center (located in the library basement).

Sponsored by the Men's Personal Growth Group, the film will be followed by an informal discussion about the film and the group.

Chad Glang, a doctoral student in counseling psychology, and John Eveland, a student in the master's counseling program will be available to discuss signing-up for group sessions.

Held Tuesday from 3:30-5:30 p.m. beginning Oct. 10, in the University Counseling Center (Susan Campbell Hall), these meetings require an advance signing-up in the Counseling Center.

According to the directors, the group will "explore our feelings together." Focusing primarily on issues of being male, the sessions will involve sharing of personal experiences, as well as working on problem areas.

Parks conference starts

The annual Oregon Parks and Recreation Conference is slated to begin Oct. 5, in Astoria, Oregon. The theme for the three-day conference is "There is a Reason for Leisure."

The conference will be highlighted by three key-note addresses. Charles H. Odegaard, Director of Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission will speak to delegates on Oct. 5. Leise Robbins, Regional Institute Director of the Civil Service Commission Training Center will be the key-noter on Oct. 6. Mayor Neil Goldschmidt of Portland will close the conference at a session on Oct. 7. Goldschmidt will talk on the tax revolt.

Also being offered are various workshops and informational sessions. Of special interest are sessions dealing with public relations, park maintenance, therapeutic recreation, working with volunteers, youth programming and natural resources.

Appointments unnecessary for work-study referrals

New courses also have been added to the schedule. Creative Activities for Children, Development in Childhood and Sewing as a Business will be taught by driver-instructor Barbara Stout.

Crisis center expanding

Looking Glass Family Crisis Intervention Center is in the process of soliciting help from community clubs and organizations to furnish its newly remodeled shelter home at 550 River Road.

A CETA crew has worked through the summer to expand the capabilities of the home in the areas of: client capacity, office space, recreational space, and additional family counseling rooms.

Looking Glass has asked community clubs and organizations for donations of household furnishings and accessories, linens, and recreational equipment.

An open house will be held at the Looking Glass shelter home upon completion of the remodeling-furnishing project to thank organizations who help with the project.

Study abroad forms due

The 1979-80 competition for grants for graduate study abroad offered under the Mutual Educational Exchange Program (Fulbright-Hays) and by foreign governments, universities and private donors will close Oct. 16, 1978. Only two more weeks remain in which graduating seniors and qualified graduate students may apply for one of the 505 awards which are available to 53 countries.

Most of the grants offered provide round-trip transportation, tuition and maintenance for one academic year. A few provide international travel only, or a stipend intended as a partial grant-in-aid.

Candidates must be U.S. citizens at the time of application, hold a bachelor's degree or its equivalent by the beginning date of the grant, have language ability commensurate with the demands of the proposed study projects, and good health.
