

Broadcast sessions due

The Oregon Association of Broadcasters and Oregon State University will sponsor a quintet of sessions concerning broadcast media Friday on the OSU campus.

Titled "Broadcasting 1978 — Meet the Media," the event will feature professional broadcasters conducting sessions on media and marketing, programming, job entry, sales, and news for students of journalism, broadcasting and advertising.

Registration fee, which will include lunch, will be \$4.

Education grant received

The University of Oregon has received a \$95,000 grant from the U.S. Office of Education for the first year of a study to develop an assessment strategy and teaching curriculum for severely and profoundly retarded adolescents and adults.

Impetus for the four-year study, directed by Andrew Halpern, University professor of special education, comes from Public Law 94-142, the federal legislation requiring public educational opportunity for handicapped persons.

Principal investigator for the project is Dan Close, research associate with the research and training center in mental retardation of the University Center on Human Development. The project also will involve a number of part-time researchers.

Minority fellowships offered

The National Science Foundation will award approximately 50 new Minority Graduate Fellowships for 1979-80. The NSF Minority Graduate Fellowship Program is open only to persons who are citizens or nationals of the United States when they apply and are American Indian, Alaskan Native, black, Mexican American/Chicano, or Puerto Rican. The application deadline is Dec. 8. 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Filing deadline near for fall term degrees

The list of degree candidates for Fall term graduation is now being compiled by the Office of the Registrar. The last day upon which an application may be filed for degree to be granted Fall term is October 13. This date will be enforced because of the many operations of checking, clearing and printing which must follow.

To qualify for the degree applied for a student must have completed all necessary work and procedures by the end of the term. All transcripts from other schools which are necessary for a degree should be sent to the attention of Graduation, Office of the Registrar, in order that it may be on file by the deadline of December 22. This includes work taken through the Division of Continuing Education.

Any student who has applied previously and did not receive the degree must reapply.

Intern program planned

The University of Oregon and the Oregon State Legislature have established a Legislative Internship Program to provide University students with opportunities to work with the legislature during its 1979 session.

The program, coordinated for the entire University by the School of Community Service and Public Affairs, invites students from all University departments to participate. Application deadline for winter and spring term placements is Nov. 17.

Both undergraduates and graduate students may earn academic credit through the program, which offers practical experience in areas such as research, analysis of issues, oral presentation of issue briefs, writing on legislative problems, and personal contact with legislative staff, legislators and their constituents.

Although University students have served as legislative interns in the past, this is the first time a University-wide program has been coordinated by CSPA.

Driver safety classes set

More Oregon drivers, perhaps as many as 600 per month, may soon find themselves back in school for at least eight hours under a Motor Vehicles Division administrative rule change which took effect this week.

The state's driver improvement program will put a driver in a safety course if he or she gets one moving conviction within six months, or two convictions or two preventable accidents within any 12-month period after a warning letter is received.

A driver assigned to either program must pay \$5 to take the course.
