

Art supplies RE-CREATED from scraps

Scrap. Eugene businesses throw away literally tons of it says Sherold Barr of RE-CREATE, a program that turns everything from old movie film to discarded mechanical parts into art supplies.

RE-CREATE is an "art materials resource and idea center" created by Eugene Parks and Recreation Department's Cultural Arts Program to demonstrate to the community that clean scrap materials can be used for art projects and games.

Similar projects are thriving across the country. The Boston Children's Museum has a Recycle Center, San Francisco has SCRAP (Scrounger Center for Reusable Art Parts) and Pittsburgh has an HEW funded program.

The Eugene program was established in January when Barr

went to local businesses, mostly retail, and collected scrap materials. She doesn't recommend that individuals try it.

"It's much easier if you're representing a group," she says. Factories and businesses often don't take the time to cater to individuals, but feel good about supporting a worthwhile project.

"They don't really like to throw things out, and like the idea of them being used," she says.

Another person has since been hired to do the "scrounging," and materials have been collected from more than 150 Eugene businesses and manufacturers.

The list of donors includes print shops, offices, factories, frame and medical and dental supply outlets.

Once the materials arrive, creativity takes over. A mobile made of piano keys hangs from the ceiling of the RE-CREATE

center. Another creation appears to be made of cut glass but upon closer scrutiny, the pieces are eyeglass lenses.

The center is not a junk shop, Barr cautions and accepts only "quality scrap."

RE-CREATE's project ideas are available to community groups and teachers. The center demonstrates uses of scrap materials in schools and community centers. Workshops are held for groups than call with a specific need or workshop idea. Since June, Barr has taught more than 300 persons, including housewives, art students and children and has gone to nursing homes and senior centers to help with fund raising projects.

Barr says the center is a valuable resource for teachers, who "don't have the time to scrounge around after teaching all day."

She says she was apprehensive at first, not knowing if the

community would be interested in the program, but is pleased with the response she's been getting. "It's a really good feeling to have people calling," she says with a smile.

butted according to certain uniform criteria. The remaining 10 percent was reserved for states with a higher proportion of need. Oregon was one of two or three states that benefited from that 10 percent, called the commissioners discretionary fund, Garner says.

The new allotment formula eliminated that fund, causing an \$8 to 9 million aggregate loss for Oregon, because there was a feeling nationally that certain states were practicing "grantsmanship," he explains.

"They thought there was some kind of padding of requests," he

says. "Basically, it was jealousy on the part of other states. Oregon has never met total student need."

He says OSL is protesting the change.

Both the program expansions and the new state allotment formula go into effect next fall.

"We have managed to be protected during the 1978-80 school year because they allowed for a one-year phase in," Garner says. "Aid will not decrease, but it won't increase either."

The year after that? "Wham," he says.
