The Oregon Labor Education and Research Center (LERC), located at the University, has been awarded a \$50,000 grant by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration of the U.S. Department of Labor to fund a special health and safety project for state workers.

According to Emory Via, LERC director, the grant will fund a program geared to educating union and employee association members on their job safety rights, on how to deal with health and safety problems encountered on the job, and on how to organize and operate safety and health committees.

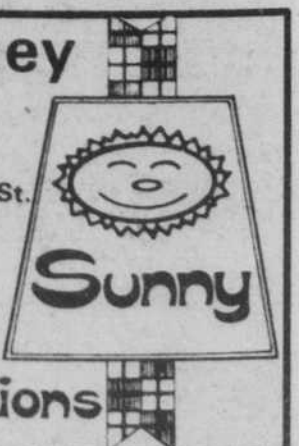
