

Coalition sets protest

SALEM — The Religious Coalition Against the Death Penalty will voice its objection to Ballot Measure 8, which would reinstate capital punishment, at a public rally, a march and a bread and soup supper here Wednesday.

The public rally will start at noon on the steps of the state Capitol in Salem. At 1 p.m., marchers will move to the Oregon State Penitentiary from the Capitol. At 3 p.m., denominational meetings will be held for those interested at locations to be specified after the march. A free bread and soup supper will be offered at 5:30 p.m. in the Bearcat Cavern, Putnam University Center. Afterward, Bishop Jack Tuell will present the Religious Coalition's argument against the death penalty.
