## Pulitzer winner Anthony Lewis lectures Thursday

Pulitzer Prize-winning newspaper columnist Anthony Lewis will deliver a Henry Failing lecture at the University Thursday, Oct. 26.

Lewis, 51, who writes a twice-weekly column for The New York Times, will speak at 8 p.m. in the EMU Ballroom on "The Rights of the Press — and the Public."

Considered to be an expert on the constitutional rights and duties of the press, Lewis won the second of his two Pulitzer Prizes in 1963 for coverage of the U.S. Supreme Court.

A native of New York City, Lewis graduated from Harvard College in 1948. He worked for The New York Times Sunday department from 1948 to 1952, then joined The Washington Daily News as a general assignments reporter. He returned to The New York Times in 1955.

The UO's Failing Distinguished Lecture series is supported through a bequest made to the University in memory of Henry Failing, a Portland banker who served as an early chairman of the University Board of Regents. The series has brought prominent artists and scholars to the campus since 1948.

The lectures are open to the public. There is no admission charge.

## China study funds offered

Application forms are available through the University's Department of East Asian Studies for a special fellowship program with the People's Republic of China (Taiwan), according to Angela Jung, acting head of the department.

November 13, 1978 is the application deadline for the training and study fellowships, which will begin in January 1979, and are offered through the Committee on Scholarly Communication with the People's Republic of China.

A limited number of scholarships are available for senior scholars who wish to carry out research in the People's Republic of China, says Jung. She said the fellowships pay expenses, including travel.
