Grant proposals accepted

The Oregon Committee for the Humanities is now accepting proposals from nonprofit organizations interested in receiving grants for the promotion of the Humanities in any field.

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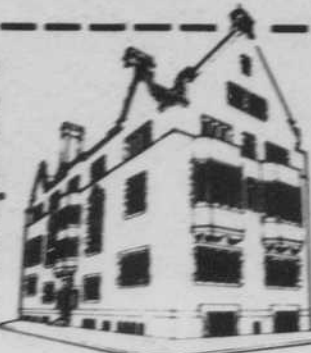
