

positive and creative IFC relationships with programs and people. The Planned Program Budgeting System used last year (much like zero-based budgeting) brought clarity and reasonableness to hearings. With minor adjustments it will work even better.

Last Spring the EMU Board passed a policy statement, and the IFC unanimously concurred, which would require that the EMU return to the IFC all unspent Incidental Fee Funding at year's end. This means that about \$20,000 of your money would've been used to decrease this year's Incidental Fee rather than be used to cover Recreation Center and Food Service losses. This is the first time that the EMU Board and Management have strongly disagreed.
