

Inconsistency stunts netters Women

It was up one day and down the next for the Oregon women volleyballers as they won their first three matches and lost their next three in successive days at the Oregon Invitational held Friday and Saturday.

The Ducks whipped Western Washington 15-6, 15-12; Oregon

State 15-1, 15-5, and Simon Fraser 15-12 and 15-9 on Friday. But on Saturday Oregon fell to Utah, Washington and Western Washington.

The loss to Western Washington, who the Ducks handled so easily on Friday, particularly galled coach Chris Voelz. "I don't

think the girls knew where they were during the match," she said. "I was speechless afterward, and that doesn't happen very often. We just weren't moving. We were sluggish. We lacked that crispness from the night before."

Part of the Ducks's problem was the absence of senior setter Sue Stadler, who went down after the Washington match with a muscle spasm.

Stadler was named to the tournament team along with Oregon's Shawna Baxter.

"Without Sue in there I don't think they (the Ducks) knew exactly where to look for leadership," explained Voelz.

The Ducks had looked especially good Friday night in beating Oregon State, who had taken Oregon in two straight games in Montana two weeks ago. But Voelz feels the flush of Friday's success might have been a bit too much for the Ducks. "We were just plain flat Saturday," she said. "The girls had been so high the night before that they didn't know how to handle it."

Utah won the tournament, beating Washington in the finals.

Oregon's next competition comes Friday and Saturday at the Region Nine's final seeding tournament to be held in Seattle. The Ducks finished fifth in Montana at the first regional seeding tourney.

"If the girls forget the reason for Saturday afternoon, and remember the victory celebration of Friday night, I think we'll be a real surprise," Voelz said.

toured. We felt like we could have given them (Oregon) a challenge."

"I knew the first mile wouldn't be unbearable," Schmidt said when asked to compare Saturday's race with the 1976 and 1977 races. In those meets she finished third and second, respectively, to Seattle Pacific's Debbie Quartier. 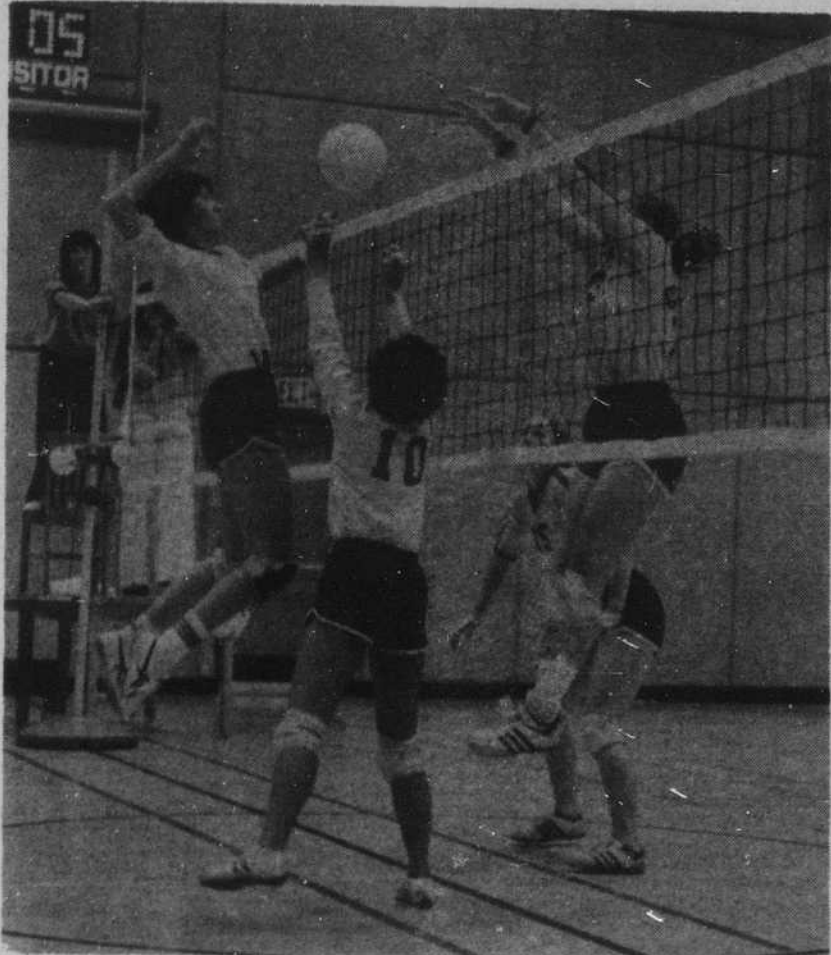

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Maurice Lucas, playing his first National Basketball Association game of the regular season, scored 30 points Sunday night to spark the Portland Trail Blazers to a 111-96 victory over the New York Knicks.

The 6-foot-9 power forward showed no sign of his long

layoff—scoring from all over the floor, rebounding and handing out assists.

Mychal Thompson added 21 points for the Blazers and teammate Lionel Hollins contributed 16, 12 of them in the third quarter.

The Blazers won their fifth straight game to raise their record to 6-4.
