Such problems are related to a "new view of the military commitment," he said.

"Basically, they changed the approach in recruiting of personnel for the service," says Gen. David C. Jones, Air Force chief of staff. "We've moved away from the normative values of a calling of profession embodied in the words of 'duty, honor and country,' toward an appeal based on monetary compensation and the values of the marketplace."

The House Armed Services Committee also met in February 1978 to discuss military posture. Committee members and defense department representatives discussed a 1977 report proposing a wartime draft system, which suggested that substantial improvements presently are needed in the Selective Service.

Selective Service staff concluded in 1977 that such improvements could be made without additional resources or peacetime registration. But staffers added that extra resources would be needed to meet the demands of a national emergency.

The present capability for a wartime draft is considered unsatisfactory by the defense department, the report said.

Thus, detailed peacetime planning and preparation are essential, it stated. "Peacetime publicity will serve to raise public consciousness of the liability of each citizen to serve in wartime," it added.

The basic wartime draft system, the report continued, is not suitable for peacetime, but it is possible to implement such a system "incrementally in a pre-mobilization situation to demonstrate to a potential adversary increasing stages of resolve and readiness."

The report also said deferment from a draft could be granted in special cases, but that the government would use very strict guidelines in order to maintain and project the image of equity.

Though the report at one point said a peacetime draft was not desirable, it offered one alternative which suggested peacetime draft registration of 20-year-old women and men. Draft registration is a precautionary alternative,

differing from actual induction, the report held.

Earlier this fall, in discussing the funding level of the Selective Service, many members of Congress expressed support for universal compulsory service, draft registration for women and the induction of doctors.

In addition, the Congressional Budget Office has recommended that the age for draft registration be lowered to 16.

CCCO members say they have found that an increasing number of young people are concerned about the possible return of draft registration.

In light of recent discussion of reinstatement of draft registration, the organization suggests that all young people—women and men—begin thinking about what they would do if faced with that possibility.

CCCO awaits the release of a December defense department report, which will evaluate the all-volunteer force. Members say they expect the study's conclusions will spark debate in Congress next year over reinstatement of the draft.

The major U.S. trade association representing security dealers and brokers, the Security Industry Association, has awarded \$56,000 to the University's Center for Capital Market Research for a study of a controversial topic in the world of finance.

The project will explore the impact of allowing U.S. commercial banks to underwrite newly issued municipal revenue bonds, according to George Kaufman, director of the center.

Kaufman said commercial banks have been prohibited from underwriting revenue bonds since the 1930s. However, he said state and local governments are issuing the bonds with increasing frequency and bills to lift the restriction have been introduced in recent Congressional sessions with the hope of reducing interest costs to issuers.

Opponents of the proposed procedure have argued that bank underwriting would increase the power of commercial banks without reducing interest rates, Kaufman said, noting that Congress has delayed action on the issue until additional evidence is presented.

The UO study is scheduled for completion in the spring of 1979. Directing the project with Kaufman will be G.O. Bierwag, associate director of the Center for Capital Market Research, and Michael Hopewell, a professor in the College of Business Administration and the department of economics.

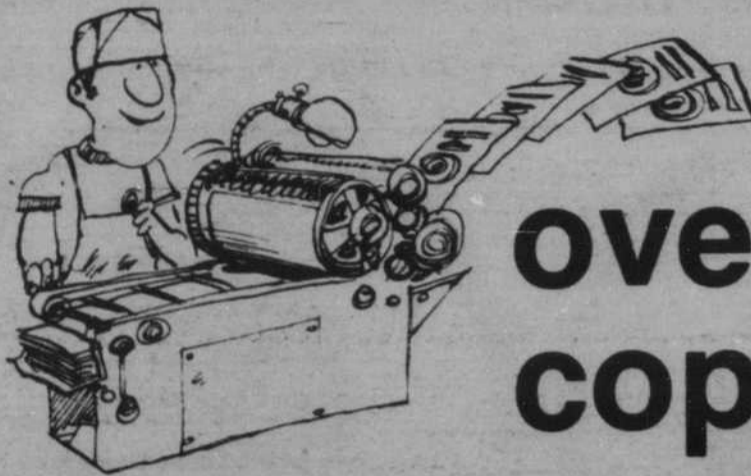
