Field hockey team loses first match, wins second

Oregon's field hockey team won its first game ever at nationals, but only after losing its first match of the tournament.

The win, 4-0 over Central Washington, was preceded by a loss to the University of Virginia 3-1. The loss to Virginia places Oregon in the consolation bracket, and the Ducks face the loser of the Delaware-Connecticut game this afternoon in Ellensburg, Wash.

Coach Nancy Plantz achieved her goal of winning a game in the national tournament, and did so convincingly. The Ducks had 40 shots-on-goal against none for Central Washington, and held the opposition shotless.

But the real test was against Virginia. "I thought we played

well, but our inexperience showed up. We had a chance to win but we didn't get the goals," she says.

Oregon had 10 shots-on-goal compared to 13 for Virginia. "I thought Virginia was the most aggressive team we've played all year," says Plantz.

Belinda Stillwell scored two goals and had one assist for the Ducks in the second game, and Lynn Manildi and Hanna Munson scored one each.

Today's match features either Delaware (third in the national tournament last year), or Connecticut (sixth in the tournament last year) and Plantz says both teams are better than Virginia. "Both Connecticut and Delaware are superior to Virginia, but we're going for it," she says.

Remaining 83 passes go on sale

With the first men's home basketball game only two days away, the University's athletic department still holds 83 unsold athletic passes, according to ASUO vice president Lisa Barnhardt.

"Demand has just been less this year," says Barnhardt. "I think students are just waiting to see how the team will do."

The athletic department has decided not to wait, and will place the remaining passes on sale today and Friday at the ticket office from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. A student ID card and paid fees card are required to buy the passes, which sell for \$37.80. Those who have already purchased tickets may not buy another.

The passes allow students to attend all 15 home men's basketball games.
