

Law class open to laity

Applications are now being accepted for an 11-week course in "Law for Lay People," which begins Jan. 4 at the University.

The evening course, offered through the Division of Continuing Education, will be taught weekly on Thursdays, at 7:30 p.m. in Room 129 of the Law School.

Each session will be divided into two parts. A different Eugene-Springfield area attorney will address each of the 22 topics.

The first session will be "The Law, the Courts and the Lawyer" by Lane County Circuit Court Judge Edwin Allen.

Topics in later sessions will include "Buying and Selling Your Home" by attorney Jeff Brenner; "Small Claims Court" by Lane County District Court Judge Bryan Hodges; "Income Tax" by attorney Richard Quinn; "How Laws Are Made and Changed" by State Senator and lawyer Ted Kulongsoski; and "The Defense" by Shelly Smith, lawyer with the public defender's office.

The course is sponsored by the University's Division of Continuing Education, the School of Law and the Lane County Bar Association.

The cost is \$20 if registration is completed by Jan. 2 with the Continuing Education office at 1479 Moss St., phone 686-4231. Participants may also register at 7 p.m. the night of the first class. The fee will be \$25.

Professor wins grant

History professor Stanley Pierson has received a grant for 1978-79 from the National Endowment for the Humanities to research the German Socialist Democratic Party in Bonn and the archives of the International Institute for Social History in Amsterdam.

Pierson has written two books recently on British Socialism, including *Marxism and the Origins of British Socialism*, Cornell Press, 1973, and *British Socialism: The Journey from Fantasy to Politics*, Harvard Press, (to be published in Spring, 1979).

Pierson says he is moving from British Socialism to a study of the role of the middle class in the German Socialist movement from 1890 to 1920, in order to study the comparative history of the International Socialist Movement. Pierson teaches modern European history and an Honor's College sequence. He plans to leave for Europe in September.

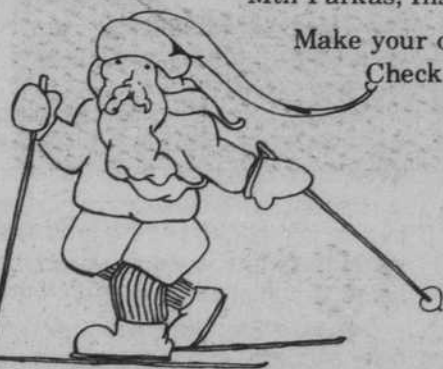
