

Host families in demand

American host families are being sought for 500 Scandinavian high school students from Sweden, Norway, Denmark and Finland for the school year 1979-80, in a program sponsored by the American Scandinavian Student Exchange.

The students, ages 16 and 17, will arrive in the United States in late August 1979, attend the local high school, and return home in late June, 1980. The students, all fluent in English, have been screened by their school representatives in Scandinavia and have pocket money and medical insurance.

Also, American families interested in hosting a Scandinavian student, age 16 to 18, during five weeks in the summer (June 21 to late July) 1979 are being sought. The 200 students in this program will not attend school.

ASSE is also seeking American students, age 16 to 18, who would like to spend a high school year with a Scandinavian family or participate in the five-week family stay next summer.

Program attacks smoking

Smokers who want to quit can get help through the Oregon Smoking Control Program at the University, which currently has openings.

The program, housed in the Psychology Clinic in Straub Hall at 15th Avenue and Onyx Street, offers treatment individually and in groups, and focuses on both initial cessation of smoking and subsequent maintenance of non-smoking.

Although the program does have a research component, only treatments believed effective are used and the program does not utilize control groups.

Cost of treatment is on a sliding scale and ranges from \$15 to \$30.

The program is directed by Edward Lichtenstein, a psychology professor who has been researching smoking control for more than 12 years. Program coordinator is Richard Brown, a doctoral student in clinical psychology who has worked in the field of smoking cessation for three years.

Nestle boycott to be discussed

Infant Formula Action Coalition, a Eugene support group promoting the boycott of Nestle products, will hold a meeting Wednesday at 12:30 p.m. in the Koinonia Center, 1414 Kincaid St.

Nestle, the largest seller of infant formula in the Third World, has been effective in encouraging mothers to switch from breast to bottle feeding. INFAC contends that while large profits go to the corporations producing the formula, loss of life or permanent brain damage may be the result for the infants.

The Nestle boycott has proven effective enough for the Nestle Corporation to mail letters to clergymen nationwide urging them not to support the boycott, which has been recently endorsed by the National Council of Churches.

Plans for a response from local clergy will be discussed at the meeting as well as ideas for the INFAC table to be set up in Valley River Center Saturday.

Bibliography available

The idea of community planning has grown rapidly in Oregon, and so has the mountain of planning documents published in the state each year, University researchers have found.

In 1967, the University's Bureau of Governmental Research and Service published a bibliography of all the planning studies developed by city, county and other governmental units over a 20-year period from 1946 until 1967. The list covered 92 pages.

An update of the bibliography published recently by the University bureau, listing documents produced during the past 10 years, fills 150 pages. And the document is less comprehensive than the original publication, University researchers say.

Trends identified in a foreword to the bibliography include a greater diversity of studies, including publications such as "neighborhood planning program" documents and "environmental quality plans," and a move toward more regional planning studies — as distinguished from single city or county reports.
