

Boyd postpones address

University Pres. William Boyd postponed his state of the University address until next month's University Assembly because so few faculty members showed up for Wednesday's 10-minute meeting.

Boyd joked with the sparsely attended assembly about the recent ice crisis, saying now he understood how the faculty felt having to "make their way across the ice" only to find an empty classroom waiting for them.

Boyd stood by his decision this week not to close the University, because of the weather, saying there are as many problems with closing as with staying open. "The hazards are almost equal." He referred to problems caused by closing during a 1969 snowstorm, including trying to call faculty members back to work.

Two agenda items for February's Assembly meeting were announced Wednesday. Biology Prof. Bayard McConaughy will propose that the ROTC military training contract with the University be terminated as an "inappropriate activity" that is "inherently immoral, self-defeating, and destructive to humanity..."

Clarence Thurber of CSPA will present a motion to establish an undergraduate, interdisciplinary major in International Studies as preparation for careers in diplomacy, business, teaching or other international careers. The proposed major will be discussed at a meeting next Thursday at 2:30 p.m. in Room 101 of the EMU. Interested students and faculty are invited to attend, says Thurber.

The program includes workshops that focus on the techniques of dynamics, sound and movement, style and characterization. They will explore the development of self-discipline aimed towards recognizing the relationship of the body and the voice.

The workshops have been successfully used by artists in such disciplines as videotape, dance, music, and the plastic arts. They will be held from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. each day in the EMU, Room 167.

Amatin will also lead film presentation and discussion on the contributions of major innovative theater troupes. The Performance Group's, "Dionysus 69" will be shown today and the Living Theatre's "The Brig" will be shown Friday. Both films will be viewed at 8 p.m. in the EMU Forum Room. Admission is free to all events.
