CONCORD, N.H. — The director of a federal agency investigating alleged radiation-induced deaths at the nation's shipyards said Sunday that government inaction is responsible for most of the fear and possible medical problems plaguing the Navy's nuclear submarine program.

"For years the responsible government agencies have not addressed the possible dangers of low-level radiation and this has only compounded the fears of many people and perhaps allowed a serious health risk to go undetected," Dr. Anthony Robbins told The Associated Press.

Robbins is the new director of the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health.

LONDON — The world's third "test-tube" baby was born in Glasgow to a 32-year-old cooking teacher, the Daily Mail newspaper reported Monday in a copyrighted story.

The baby, 5-pound, 12-ounce Alastair James Lauchen Montgomery, was born Sunday, the newspaper reported.

Dr. Patrick Steptoe performed the delicate operation of fertilizing one of Grace Montgomery's eggs in the laboratory with her husband's sperm then implanting it in her womb to mature normally, the Daily Mail said.

BANGKOK, Thailand — Vietnamese troops captured the last urban stronghold of the defeated Cambodian government forces, but the retreating soldiers struck back in isolated attacks and set up mountain and island guerrilla bases to carry on the war, Thai sources said Sunday.

"We will fight until we die," one of the Cambodian loyalists in the Thai border area reportedly told a Thai official.

ATLANTA — Teng Hsiao-Ping, vice premier of the People's Republic of China, will visit Atlanta, Houston and Seattle in addition to Washington, D.C., during his trip to the United States, the White House said Sunday.

The vice premier will arrive in Washington Jan. 28. His formal state visit will run from Jan. 29-31. The White House released Teng's schedule during President Carter's visit to Atlanta in connection with the celebration of the 50th anniversary of Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday.

Teng will visit Atlanta in President Carter's home state of Georgia Feb. 1-2; Houston, Texas, Feb. 2-3 and Seattle, Feb. 4-5.

ATHENS — Greece has advised the United States that it views a proposed increase in U.S. military aid to Turkey as a threat to the area's balance of power to Greece's disadvantage.

Government officials confirmed Saturday that Greek objections were officially conveyed to the U.S. government.

"The economic aid considered to be given to Turkey to face its economic crisis is an issue which concerns Turkey and the countries which will help her," a government spokesman said.

Khomaini says he'll supervise Islamic Iranian government

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ayatollah Khomaini, an Iranian religious leader opposed to the Shah of Iran, said Sunday he probably will announce establishment of an Islamic state in Iran in a few days.

"It is probable that after the departure of the shah, we will announce it," Khomaini said in an interview on the CBS television program, "Face the Nation."

The interview was held in Pontchartrain, France, where Khomaini is in self-exile.

Khomaini said he would not have any position in the future government but that he would supervise others. Asked if he would be, in effect, the strongman of Iran, he replied, "You may assume so."

Khomaini said if his followers have the power, "and if the nation can get him," they will prevent the departure of Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi from Iran, expected this week.

"We will not permit him to leave, and we will

arrest him for his crimes, to be tried and punished," he said.

Khomaini said that because the nation has given him a vote of confidence through current demonstration, they have proclaimed that he is their leader.

Khomaini said that if the U.S. government stops supporting the shah, "then we do not have any opposition to the American people... and we will treat them with friendship and justice."

Asked if he would send Iran's army against Israel in case of a Mideast War, he replied, "We are against Israel, and we will never help Israel. We will cut off all diplomatic relation; however, sending our army against Israel in any future probable war needs a thorough study, and at this time I do not have anything to say on that."

Asked about the United States maintaining bases in Iran, he said: "American bases could not remain in Iran because they are contrary to Iranian independence."

Abzug says firing naive

NEW YORK (AP) — Bella Abzug, former co-chairwoman of the President's National Advisory Council on Women, said Sunday that President Carter showed a great deal of "naivete" in firing her last week for criticizing his economic policy.

Abzug, speaking on ABC-TV's "Issues and Answers" program, said the president was naive to expect the remaining women on the committee to continue working if she was replaced by a "yes person."

She said the problem started when the committee rejected Carter's anti-inflation policy,

contending it will cause a recession.

Abzug said most people believe women are only interested in passing the Equal Rights Amendment but she said the economy of the country is a women's issue also.

Abzug, saying the role of the advisory committee is to tell the president how women feel, claimed women believe they are going to "bleed in a social situation that cuts the heart out of their programs."

About her firing, Abzug said, "What happened the other day at the White House was like — when

a guy has a bad day at the office and he comes home and kicks his door. Well — our president probably had a bad day and instead of kicking Billy Carter, he kicked me."

She said Jordan cited the cancellation of a scheduled 15-minute November meeting with Carter because the committee felt it was too short and a press release criticizing the president's economic policy as the reasons she was being replaced.

Since Abzug's firing, 25 of the 40 members on the National Advisory Committee on Women have resigned.

Carter may call second Mideast peace summit

ATLANTA (AP) — Pres. Carter said Sunday he would not hesitate to call the leaders of Egypt and Israel to another summit meeting if that is necessary to get a peace treaty.

Speaking to a black audience at Ebenezer Baptist Church, the president said a U.S. delegation of negotiators was being sent to the Middle East this week "to resolve the last difference on language" that has bogged the treaty down.

After the language problems are worked out, Carter said: "If necessary, I will not hesitate to call Sadat and Begin to a meeting with

me again to get a peace treaty."

The framework for the peace treaty was negotiated in September when Carter, acting as mediator, invited Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin and Egyptian Pres. Anwar Sadat to the presidential retreat. Carter spoke at the church during a celebration of the anniversary Monday of Martin Luther King Jr.'s 50th birthday.

At Dobbins Air Force Base later, the president said he hoped negotiators would make rapid progress now that they have time to reassess their difficulties.

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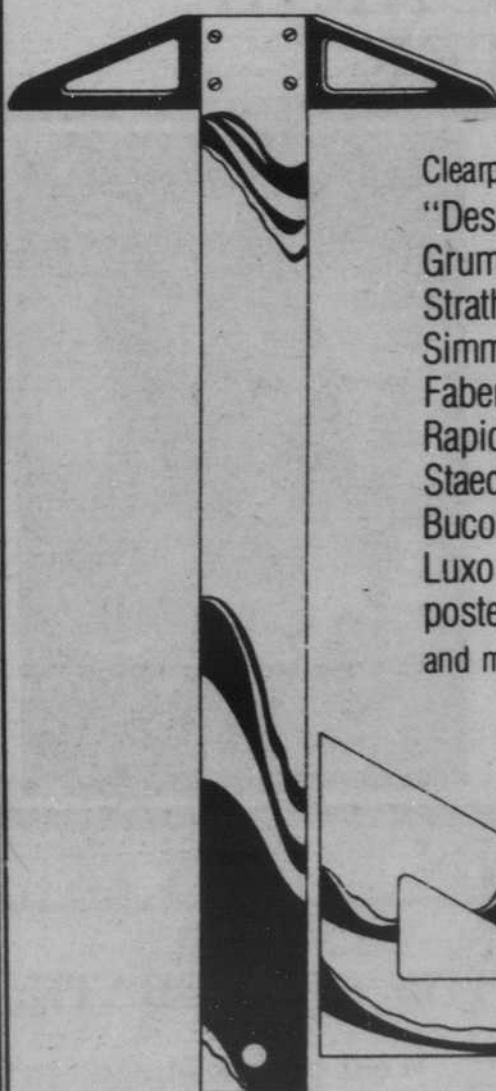
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
