The Survival Center will be sponsoring a meeting this evening for those persons interested in commenting on the "Draft Environmental Impact Statement: U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Mammalian Predator Damage Management for Livestock Protection in the Western United States." The meeting will take place at 7:30 p.m. in the EMU, room to be posted.

Included at the meeting will be a slide presentation on the subject of predator control by Sara Polenick, Northwest Field Representative for Defenders of Wildlife. The comment period on this statement ends Feb. 11. Copies of the statement will be available at the meeting from the Survival Center, Suite I, EMU.

Center plans assessed

Plans for a two-block civic center complex in downtown Eugene will come before the Eugene City Council at a meeting today.

The Eugene Civic Center Commission recommended last week that the council accept a New York architectural firm's plan for developing the two-block area bounded by 6th and 7th avenues and by Oak and Olive streets.

An \$18.5-million bond issue for a performing arts facility and parking was approved by Eugene voters last year.

Hardy Holzmann Pfeiffer Associates of New York have recommended using the west block of that area for performing arts facility, which, as now proposed, will include a music hall, theater and parking on one block of the site.

The council will consider the recommendation at 11:30 a.m. today at the Kings Table in the Oakway Mall.
