Weapon rules to be discussed

The Fish and Wildlife Commission has scheduled a public workshop to discuss the various weapons used for hunting and regulations concerning their use. The meeting will begin today at 7:30 p.m. in the conference room at Fish and Wildlife Department headquarters, 506 SW Mill St. in Portland.

No specific proposals for changes in regulations are before the commission at this time, but the commission is interested in exploring the "single weapons" concept as a means of spreading hunting pressure out and reducing overcrowding on opening weekends of popular seasons. Under a single weapons rule, a hunter would be restricted to the use of only one weapon for hunting one or more big game species. Handgun hunting is also scheduled for discussion.

The Commission has discussed various weapons rules in meetings and has received many comments from groups and individuals at public hearings in the past. The workshop is designed as an opportunity to get representatives of various interests together with Commission and Wildlife Division staff for an informal discussion of these and other hunting weapons issues.

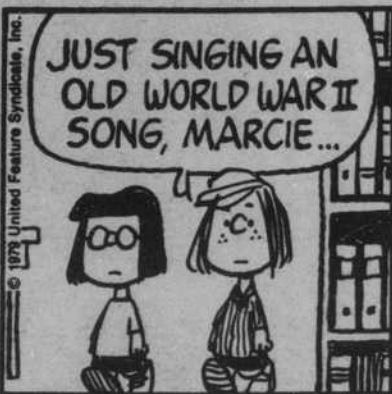
Organ concert scheduled

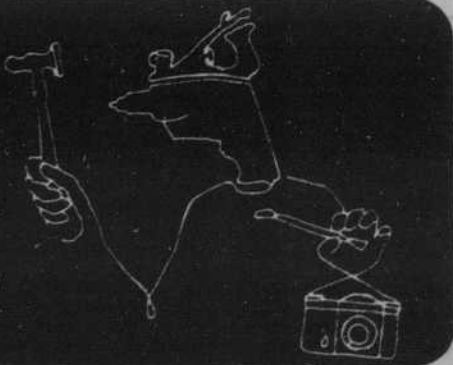
