Conference to focus on class discipline

"Preventing Discipline Problems" will be the theme of a conference for educators Tuesday Jan. 30 at the University.

The one-day conference sponsored by the Oregon School Study Council is open to educators at all levels.

Speakers are Chester Bowser, Oregon Teacher of the Year from Crater High School in Central Point talking about his classroom experiences; Ray Lowe, UO Professor of Education demonstrating counseling techniques which recognize students and teachers as equals; Howard Horner, a Superintendent of the David Douglas School District presenting a plan to involve community staff and students in developing a discipline statement; and Adrian DeFrank and other members of North Eugene's Community Action Team discussing cooperation of police courts and schools.

Cost is \$6 or \$10 per person depending on whether the educator's school district is a member of the Oregon School Study Council. The fee includes lunch.

Registration may be made with the Council, 124 College of Education. Interpreters for the deaf, a Braille agenda and wheel chair access can be provided.

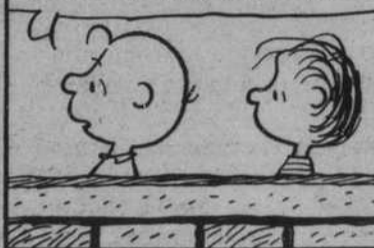

Professor receives grant

History professor William Toll has received a National Endowment for the Humanities grant to complete a project titled "Covenant on the Urban Frontier: Portland Jewry Over Four Generations, 1858-1950."

The award for \$37,740, will allow Toll and Shirley Tanzer of Portland to prepare a volume combining oral histories with essays analyzing social change within the community.

Toll has published articles on his research in the "Jewish Journal of Sociology," "Pacific Historical Review" and "Western Historical Quarterly." His book "Lifting the Veil: Black Social Thought from Reconstruction Through the Pan-African Congresses" will be published by Temple University Press this fall.

The grant will begin in June 1979 at which time Toll will leave the University permanently.
