

Folding session scheduled

The 1979 edition of the Non-Smoker's Guide to Dining Out in Eugene and Springfield has come back from the presses. All that remains before the 10,000 copies of the guide are distributed is for them to be collated, folded and stapled.

The Eugene-Springfield chapter of the Association for Non-Smokers' Rights has scheduled a collating, folding and stapling session for Saturday at noon, at the University Music School.

Anyone interested in helping on the project is welcome to attend. Free refreshments will be served.

The guide is 16 pages, larger than the initial 12-page edition published last summer. Listed are 69 restaurants in Eugene and Springfield which have non-smoking sections, non-smoking hours or prohibit smoking entirely.

Another collating, folding and stapling session is tentatively set for Feb. 10, same time, same place. The guides will be delivered to distribution points in February, and are free of charge.

OSPIRG receives grant

The National Science Foundation has awarded the Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group a six-month, \$24,000 grant to help citizens and citizen groups identify problems they have participating in planning for economic development.

According to Bill Bordas, project director, the program will develop plans for community based efforts to improve citizens' access to information on issues which affect the economic well-being of their communities and the abilities of citizens to participate in economic decisions. The project will focus on citizen access to decisions which affect the number and kinds of jobs available in a community, Bordas said.

Project staff will examine citizen access to economic development planning and decisions in three Oregon communities: Springfield, Northeast Portland and the Whiteaker neighborhood in Eugene. In each community the staff will talk with governmental and private sector decision makers, and organizations of citizens such as church groups, citizens groups and labor unions.

Project Director Bordas and staff member Scott Clement will be based in Eugene at 686-4892. Staff member Susan Feldman will be based at OSPIRG's Portland office (222-9641).

Corrections, amplification

A map of Eugene that accompanied Wednesday's story on community garden plots inadvertently included five garden sites which no longer exist.

As the text of the article indicated, city and county residents may rent a garden plot at only six locations listed on the map: Alton Baker Park, Polk Street, 15th Avenue and Hayes Street, Cal Young Road and Coburg Road, 12th Avenue and Jefferson Street and Patterson Community School.

A partial quote reported Jan. 15 from Mary Roberts' keynote address before the state women's caucus may have been misleading. In discussing her contention that diversity among caucus members can add strength to the caucus Roberts said:
