Trident opponents gather

Persons against the proposed Trident submarine base in Bangor, Wash. will gather today in resistance to the base and in support of participants in last May's occupation.

Trident is an \$80 billion nuclear submarine/weapons program being developed by the U.S. navy.

Nearly 300 people entered the Bangor base in an act of civil disobedience May 22. Thirteen men and women from Eugene are among the 176 who were arrested, tried and convicted in December and will appear before the federal magistrate in Seattle today to face maximum sentences of six months in prison and \$500 fines.

The support group will gather today from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in front of the federal building, 22 E. 7th Ave. The public is invited to participate.

Scottish night planned

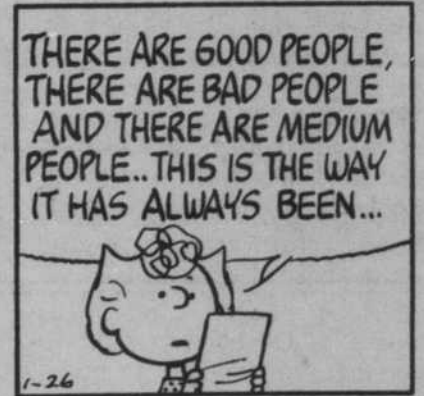
