John Bartels, Eugene Water and Electric Board commissioner, will speak today on his support of the Strube Dam and Cougar additions. He represents Ward 4, which includes the University district.

Strube Dam, a catch dam on the McKenzie River's south fork, was proposed by the Army Corps of Engineers earlier this year and would allow Cougar Reservoir to be raised and lowered as much as 25 feet a week to meet the electrical peaking demands of the Bonneville Power Administration.

Bartel's speech is sponsored by the Survival Center and will take place in Room 101, EMU.
