

# IFC OKs many goals but turns down others

In a long budget hearing session Tuesday night, the IFC approved goals for three groups, turned down two goals for Action Now, and voted to reconsider at a later date its original approval of the Oregonians' goals.

After the five scheduled hearings, committee members reconsidered goals for Switchboard and the Model U.N., which met with approval the second time around, and goals for the YMCA's Big Brother program, which did not.

Gaining unanimous approval were the goals of the Physical Education Undergraduate Coalition (PEUC) and the Graduate Student Organization of the Center for Educational Policy and Management (GSO-CEPM).

PEUC's requests included funding for newsletters and publicity while the GSO-CEPM asked for funding for guest speakers.

The IFC also accepted the Forensic team's goals, which include funding for symposiums, travel funds and hosting the annual high school speech tournament.

Action Now met with less success — its goals for maintenance of its tool library and funds for conference attendance passed, but the IFC rejected funding for Action-sponsored Search classes and the tool library's truck, which is broken down.

IFC member Janet Eggleston pointed out that funding for the classes is available throughout the Search program.

The committee, in a narrow vote, at first approved the 1979-80 Oregonians' subsidy but then voted to reconsider the issue at a later hearing.

At the center of the dispute among IFC members was the yearbook's deficit. "I simply can't fund a program that's \$32,000 in debt," said IFC member Maria Rojo.

## Global capitalism discussed by economic critic

Paul Sweezy, internationally known economist and critic of capitalism, will speak on "International Capitalism at the Crossroads" Thursday at 8 p.m. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Sweezy has investigated the theory and development of economic systems for more than 50 years.

He received his Ph.D. in economics from Harvard in 1937. He has taught at Harvard, Cornell, Stanford, Yale and the New School of Social Research. Sweezy has been the editor of the "Monthly Review", a socialist magazine, since 1949.

He has also published many works on comparative economic systems, capitalism, and the history and theory of economics. His most recent works include "Socialism in Cuba", "Modern Capitalism and Other Essays", and "Revolution and Counter-Revolution in Chile".

Registration is required one week in advance by phone, 687-5329.

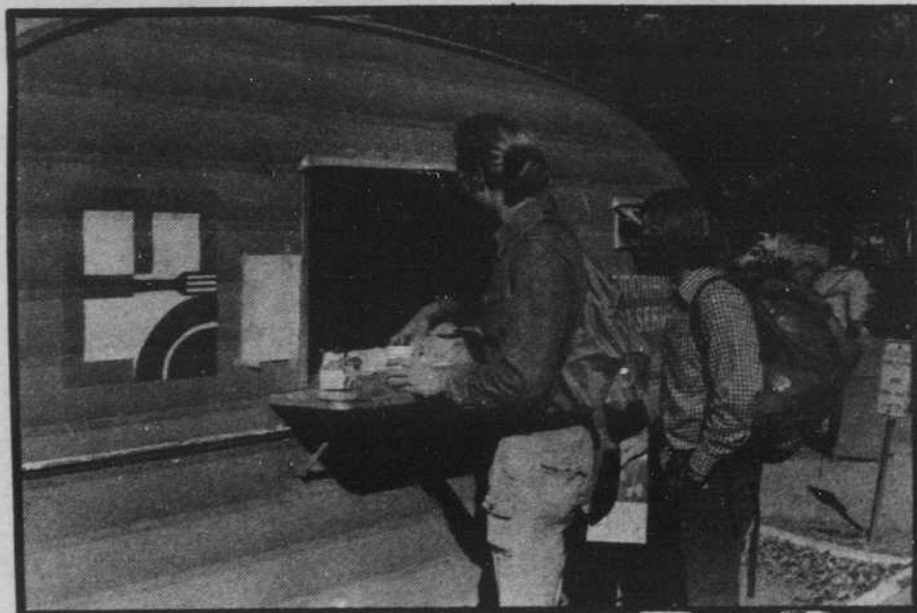
