

Haney tells Ducks: be tough or sit down

After two weekend losses at home, the men's basketball team travels to Arizona State today for an 8 p.m. game and Arizona Saturday for a 3:30 p.m. contest.

If the 3-8 Ducks are to avenge an earlier 65-54 loss to Arizona State, they will have to be more aggressive, says coach Jim Haney.

"We got pushed around on the backboards last time, and we can't get intimidated like that," he says.

The center position will be very important to the Ducks, and the coach says the starting lineup could change. "After Saturday night (a 87-64 loss to USC) it's wide open. We'll wait

and see how they practice."

Seniors Rob Closs and Kelvin Small, along with juniors Dan Hartshorne and John Murray have started most of the season, even though Haney admits they don't necessarily fit his new running strategy.

"I think the players we have in the program can function in the system, but that's not to say they are the ideal players," says Haney. "I think in recruiting we are looking for athletes with speed and quickness who will fit into the system more easily."

Until then, Haney says he needs a blend of youth and veterans. "Sometimes the determination to get the job done overcomes all else."
