His visit is being sponsored by the College of Recreation and Park Management.

As many as 1,300 high school seniors, community college students and their parents will deluge the campus Saturday for the University's annual "Duck Preview."

The day-long preview is sponsored by the admissions office to give prospective students an opportunity to become more familiar with the University.

The day's activities include sessions in which participants can learn more about specific academic areas, personal services and extra-curricular activities.

Chemist receives grant

A University research chemist is probing into the chemical and physical makeup of cell membranes with grants totaling more than \$150,000.

Bruce Hudson, University assistant chemistry professor, is using lasers and other instruments to "light up" cell membranes to find out why they selectively allow some substances to go in and out of the cell, while rejecting other substances.

"Cell membranes," explains Hudson, "are made up of proteins and have 'little pumps' which push some substances in and other substances out — and what we're trying to understand is how those pumps work."

Hudson also views the cell activity with a "fluorescent probe," a light-bearing chemical substance called paranaric acid. Paranaric acid is produced from Mikita seeds which are only found in the Fiji and Solomon Islands.

Hudson is working under a five-year "Research Career and Development Award." The award was presented to him last year by the Public Health Service in Bethesda, Maryland.

Navajo chairer to speak

Peter MacDonald, chairer of the Navajo Tribe and a key figure in the Council of Energy Resource Tribe will speak on energy resource development on Indian lands Saturday at 9:15 a.m. in the EMU Forum Room.

CERT oversees energy development on Indian lands and has attempted to gain control over the massive and valuable energy resources on Indian lands throughout the west.

MacDonald will talk on energy resource development and tribal needs for technologically sophisticated manpower.

MacDonald's speech is part of a one-day recruitment program by the University and the Council for Minority Education.
