

New program approved

Forty-four students are now enrolled in the new elementary teacher training program at the University's College of Education.

The program is the first to be approved by the Oregon Teacher Standards and Practices Commission for meeting the requirements of new public laws directing public schools to provide education for handicapped students is commonly called "mainstreaming."

Approval of the program was given in December, at the end of a one-term pilot program enrolling 20 students. All education colleges must alter their programs for training both elementary and secondary teachers by 1980 to meet the new requirements of the commission.

The University program, called TEEM for "Training Elementary Educators for Mainstreaming," is a team approach which places shared responsibility on students, faculty members and cooperating public school teachers.

According to Fay Haisley, the University's Coordinator of elementary teacher education, the program is a new approach to teacher training which will be extended next year to the college's training of administrators and secondary teachers.

Those interested in attending should wear semi-formal attire.



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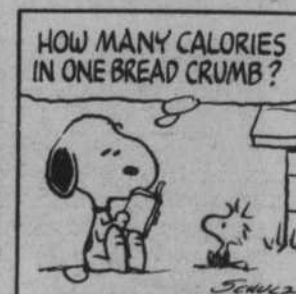
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Prof discusses sunlight power as energy source

A University physics professor and solar energy specialist will discuss how sunlight is analyzed to determine its potential uses in a talk Wednesday.

Physicist David McDaniels, of the University's Solar Energy Center and director of a Bonneville Power Administration-financed study of solar radiation in Oregon, will speak on "Analysis of Direct and Diffuse Components of Solar Radiation" at 8 p.m. in Room 282, Lawrence Hall.

The presentation, open free to the public, is part of a winter seminar being sponsored by the Solar Energy Center.

For the past seven years McDaniels has taught a course titled "The Sun as Future Energy Source." He has written a book by the same title to be published this spring.

State funds school visits

The University has received funding from the Oregon Department of Education to send "visiting teams" to 100 Oregon School districts to review their compliance with the federal Education for All Handicapped Children Act of 1975.

According to Robert Mattson, the University professor of education in charge of the teams participating in the review, the state is legally required to perform such reviews during a three-year period to assure that handicapped persons are receiving appropriate education in public schools. Oregon has 300 school districts, 100 of which are being reviewed this year.

Teams of faculty members and doctoral students from the College of Education will begin their visits this week, Mattson says. The reviews should be completed by the end of spring term, he says, and reports will be submitted to the ODE by August 31, when the funding period ends. A total of \$119,669 was granted to the University for the reviews.
